COLUMBIA CITY PLAYS DECATUR HERE TOMORROW

Yellow Jackets Play Final Game Of Season Friday Afternoon

Faced with the possibility of capturing their second straight northeastern Indiana conference championship, the Decatur Yellow Jackets will tangle with the Columbia City Eagles in the locals' final game of the season at 2:15 o'clock Friday afternoon at Worthman Field.

The Jackets won their first conference football title in history last year by playing through the entire season without a defeat, scoreless ties with Central and South Side accounting for the other two games on the schedule.

This year, Decatur has won five games, lost two and tied one, an excellent record when viewed from the tough schedule played.

These two defeats were at the hands of Muncie and Fort Wayne Central, annually two of the outstanding teams in the state.

However, the Decatur-Central game was not listed as a conference game, therefore the Jackets boast a record of three victories without a defeat in the conference standing. These three victories were scored over Auburn, Bluffton and North Side of Fort Wayne.

Coach Andrews has announced that his squad is in good physical condition and is determined to close the season with a victory over the Eagles. Columbia City last week gave Bluffton a tough

struggle, the Tigers scoring a 12-0 victory through long forward passes. Columbia City is reported to have one of the heaviest high school teams in this section of the state.

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UNITED STATES WILL ENTER IN 1936 OLYMPICS

Chairman Says This Country Will Participate In Games

Chicago, Oct. 24—(UP)—Participation of the United States in the 1936 Olympic games at Berlin, Germany, was pledged today in a frank, unqualified statement by Avery Brundage, Chicago, chairman of the American Olympic committee.

He charged that attempts to boycott the Olympic games because of Nazi religious persecution were fomented by organizations and individuals with communistic antecedents.

He said the agitation against United States participation has been carried on entirely by persons who "haven't been closer to Berlin than Manhattan Island."

He left no doubt as to the American Olympic committee's stand in the controversy.

"The Olympic games belong to the athletes and not to the politicians," Brundage said.

"Knowing the temper of the true sport leaders and of the amateur athletes of this country who are unanimous on this subject, I say positively that there

will be teams representing the United States in the 1936 games.

"The sportsmen of this country will not tolerate the use of clean American sport as a vehicle to transplant old world hatreds to the United States."

In addition to his duties as chairman of the Olympic committee, the tall, outspoken Chicago realtor is president of the American Olympic Association. He is a former president of the National A. A. U.

Brundage said the committee is supplementing his statement with a pamphlet intended to "correct misinformation which has been disseminated to persons who heretofore have given no thought to amateur sport or the Olympics."

The pamphlet will be mailed within a few days to universities, newspapers, and other organizations.

Continuing, he said, "In accepting the invitation to compete in the 1936 Olympic games, the American Olympic committee, like the Olympic committee of 48 other nations, have accepted, does not repudiate the policies of any government."

"The committee has nothing but sport and its merits."

"Attempts to twist and turn the unanimous decision of the committee into an endorsement of the Nazi policies are but barefaced effrontery."

"Our committee will allow our athletes to be 'own' or amateur sport to be 'refined to a political issue'."
