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BEHIND THE SCENES in HOLLYWOOD

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HOLLYWOOD — Movie location men have found a replica of Tennessee's famous "Valley of the Drifts" in the hills of the Los Angeles area.

The picture, which will be one of Hollywood's biggest sets, is "The Charge of the Light Brigade," which will star Errol Flynn.

Warner Brothers had to find a valley floor big enough for the operations of 3,000 infantry and of 600 cavalrymen.

Tennyson's poem had only 600 cavalrymen in the charge, but studio research departments are more accurate than poets and they have determined that 600 cavalrymen actually stormed the Russian fortifications.
