to grow.


Police officers throughout the

COURT STUDIES  
COAL CONTROLTakes Validity Of Guffey  
Coal Act Under Ad-  
visement

Washington, Mar. 13—(U.P.)—The  
supreme court took the validity of  
the Guffey coal control act under  
advisement today with the plea of  
the new deal that its decision may  
involve the preservation of the  
constitution.

John Dickinson, assistant attorney  
general, departing from a prepared  
three and one half hour argument, said:

"This legislation is of an experimental  
nature," Dickinson said. "Much may turn on the decision  
of this court. The issues are  
much more tremendous than those  
of the present act. They are momentous."

"The issue of federal power is  
at stake, whether there lurk inter-  
stices and crevices in the constitution  
through which required federal power may have shifted  
away."

"We think the fathers in setting  
up the constitution were wise  
enough to see that the perpetuation  
of the kind of government they  
desired depended on a constitution  
strong enough to meet every  
crisis as it arose, not by military  
power but by the orderly pro-  
cesses of government."

"The time may come, if the  
Union is to be preserved and the  
federal government is to be com-  
petent to deal with subversive  
forces, when it may have to use  
other powers which we as Ameri-  
can citizens would not want to see  
used."

"We believe and submit that  
the government must be able to  
meet our national destiny by con-  
trol over commerce. In our eco-

nomic life we must have one rule  
and one law."

Dickinson's words, uttered in  
the solemn surroundings of the  
plush-draped, marble-lined cham-

ber, emphasized the importance  
which the administration attaches  
to the Guffey act.

Passed after the court had  
doomed NRA, it was designed to  
get around the limitations of that  
decision and was pushed through  
congress to forestall threats of  
labor trouble in the coal fields.


