DISTRICT MEET AT MONROEVILLE

Fort Wayne M. E. Conference At Monroeville Tuesday

Forty-three pastoral charges are to be represented at the Fort Wayne district Methodist Episcopal conference at Monroeville next Tuesday, March 17, with 13 of the charges to be from Adams county.

A pastoral charge is constituted of one or more churches under one minister, thus forming all of the Methodist Episcopal churches in Adams county into the 13 charges. The 53 charges in the Fort Wayne district are composed of 80 churches. All recommendations and business at the Monroeville conference is to be carried to the annual convention of the churches to be held in Kokomo from April 13 to 20.

One pastor and one layman are to represent their charges at the conference in Kokomo from churches in the following places and the circuits of Decatur, Pleasant Mills, Bobo, Geneva and Monroeville. The program for the Northern Indiana conference in the Main

That administrative jobs were given on a basis of political affiliations; that administrative costs were exorbitant.

The senator said his brother, M. S. Holt, Jr., had been discharged as a district WPA engineer in retaliation for his attacks.

Hopkins countered with his investigation, followed by a public letter to Holt saying:

"There is no evidence of a single case out of the thousands employed from the relief rolls having secured their work through political influence.

"Likewise, the evidence indicates that the administrative staff have been appointed on merit and

on the basis of their qualifications to do the job."

Hopkins then affirmed the dismissal of Holt's brother from his Parkersburg district job in West Virginia and struck back at the senator with these two findings as reported by Alan Johnstone, WPA investigator:

1. "During the course of my investigation in the Parkersburg district I find that early in February of this year subscriptions had been solicited and taken from the employees of the Parkersburg office to pay the expenses of broadcasting a speech delivered by Sen. Holt at St. Mary's, W. Va., on February 7."

2. The report exhibited telegrams from Holt to the West Virginia WPA director allegedly seeking additional patronage on WPA administrative payrolls.

Hopkins made public his report without comment. Holt, countered with a new speech in the sen-

ate charging the investigation used "enough whitewash to paint a line to Washington clear from Charleston, W. Va."

Auditor Holds M. A. Degree
