Noted Magician Dies In Florida

Miami Beach, Fla., Apr. 13.—(UPI)

Howard Thurston, 66, one of the world's most famous magicians,

died at his winter home here today.

Pneumonia, contracted as the result of a sudden hemorrhage which occurred two weeks ago, was the immediate cause of death.

The master of magic, compelled to go into retirement last fall when he collapsed after a performance at Charleston, West Virginia, had planned until March 20—when he suffered the hemorrhage—on returning to the stage this spring.
