Soon he was suffering from a cold,
greatly aggravated by the dark and
damp. Robertson and Scadding
kept him between them almost all
the time, hoping to keep him warm,
but he grew worse progressively.
Their suffering from hunger was
not severe, both men reporting

that they had no particular desire
for food.

They could not estimate time
accurately, but a day, perhaps two
days, before the diamond drill sank
a pipe into their prison early last
Sunday, a week after they were
trapped, they believed they could
hear their rescuers approaching.

Early Sunday the drill broke
through and they heard men
shouting through the hole from
the surface. Overjoyed, they
shouted back, believing rescue was
but hours away.

By that time Magill was in very
bad condition. He died soon after-
ward.

vestigation, reports of these polit-
ical abuses have been substantiat-
ed.

Van Nuys' investigation was based
on reports that precinct commit-
teemen in large centers of the
state are being employed as WPA
foremen or supervisors at \$150 a
month in exchange for pledges of
state convention delegates favor-
able to Lieut. Gov. M. Clifford
Townsend for the governor nomi-
nation.

Although not specifically endor-
sed by Gov. Paul V. McNutt, the
lieutenant governor generally is
considered the state administra-
tion's choice for the nomination.

Van Nuys is backing McKinney,
Indianapolis real estate man and
former state director of the Home
Owners Loan Corporation.

Pleas Greenlee, ousted patronage
secretary to Governor McNutt, is

the only other announced candi-
date for the nomination, to be made
by the state convention in June.

In addition to the alleged hiring
of precinct committeemen for po-
litical purposes, Van Nuys said he
had found that relief projects have
been withheld from some commu-
nities until Townsend delegate
strength was promised.

The political pressure has been
most severe in Lake, Vigo, Vander-
burgh and St. Joseph counties, he
charged.

"The practice is so extensive
that it must have the tacit approval
of those in charge," he said.

Both Coy and Virgil M. Sim-
mons, state conservation director
and assistant state WPA director,
are regarded strong supporters of
Townsend for the nomination.

Missouri farm wife and Republican
firebrand, will be the principal
speaker at the banquet of the In-
diana Republican editorial associa-
tion here tonight.

Mrs. Simmons first excited inter-
est of the party when she spoke at
the "grass roots" convention at
Springfield, Ill., last year.

Disregarding veterans of the
party in Indiana, the association
chose a woman for principal speak-
er for the first time in the 50-year
history of the organization.

Bangs' Latest

Move Opposed

Huntington, Ind., April 24—(UP)
—The Northern Indiana power com-
pany today sought to become a

party defendant in a suit filed by
the Municipal light and power com-
pany, Inc., of Huntington against
the public service commission.

Mayor Clare W. H. Bangs, coun-
sel for the new utility company,
filed suit in Huntington circuit
court in an effort to vacate an or-
der of the commission denying the
Municipal company an indetermi-
nate permit.

The N. I. P. opposed issuance of a
permit to the Municipal company
at a hearing several months ago.
