



Missouri Farm Wife Republican Speaker

Indianapolis, Ind., April 24—(UP)—Mrs. Elizabeth Major Simmons, Missouri farm wife and Republican firebrand, will be the principal speaker at the banquet of the Indiana Republican editorial association here tonight.

Mrs. Simmons first excited interest of the party when she spoke at Springfield, Ill., last year. Disregarding veterans of the party in Indiana, the association chose a woman for principal speaker for the first time in the 50-year history of the organization.

Although not specifically endorsed by Gov. Paul V. McNutt, the lieutenant governor generally is considered the state administration's choice for the nomination.

Van Nys is backing McKinney, Indianapolis real estate man and former state director of the Home Owners Loan Corporation.

Pleas Greenlee, ousted patronage secretary to Governor McNutt, is
