Washington, May 8—(UP)—The house, speeding the \$2,364,000,000 relief-deficiency bill toward passage approved today a \$308,000,000 appropriation to continue the civilian conservation corps at a strength of 350,000 men.

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### BONUS PAYMENT BUSINESS AID

#### Bulk Of Hoosier Veterans To Be Paid By July 15

Indianapolis, May 8.—The bulk of Hoosier veterans may expect to receive their bonus payment bonds between June 15 and July 15, Harry R. Hall, state service officer of the Indiana American Legion said today.

Hall, who has directed the work of filling out thousands of bonus applications by the Legion said that word from Washington is that 2,000,000 veterans in the United States may expect payment commencing June 15th. The bonus bonds of \$50 denominations with odd amounts in cash will be sent to the veterans by registered letter.

The machinery has been set up in Washington for quick payment of the veterans. Four hundred additional employees have been added to the treasury field force to handle payment. Government printing presses have been running 16 hours a day, turning out 38,000,000 of the bonds. A total of \$90,000 veterans have not yet filed for their bonus payments.

The plan for cashing the bonus bonds includes the designation of some 200 first and second class post offices over the country as paying centers. Veterans holding bonus bonds can cash them at these post offices, according to present plans. Veterans living in communities and towns not designated paying centers may present their bonds to the postmaster and they will be forwarded to a paying center.

Banks have loaned approximately \$60,000,000 to veterans on a previous installment. New applications for bonus payment are being received in Washington at the rate of 650 a day.

Hall urged every veteran in the state who could possibly do so to hold his bonus bonds as a "nest egg." They will draw 3 per cent interest and may be cashed in an emergency, he said.

(CONTINUED FROM PAGE ONE) neighboring countries under the Reich's roof, Great Britain asked: "A distinction is apparently drawn between the Reich and the German Nation. The question is, really, whether Germany now considers the point reached at which she can signify she recognizes and intends to respect the existing territorial and political status of Europe except insofar as it might subsequently be modified by free negotiation."

Next Germany is asked whether she is ready to include an agreement for limitation of air forces in her

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
