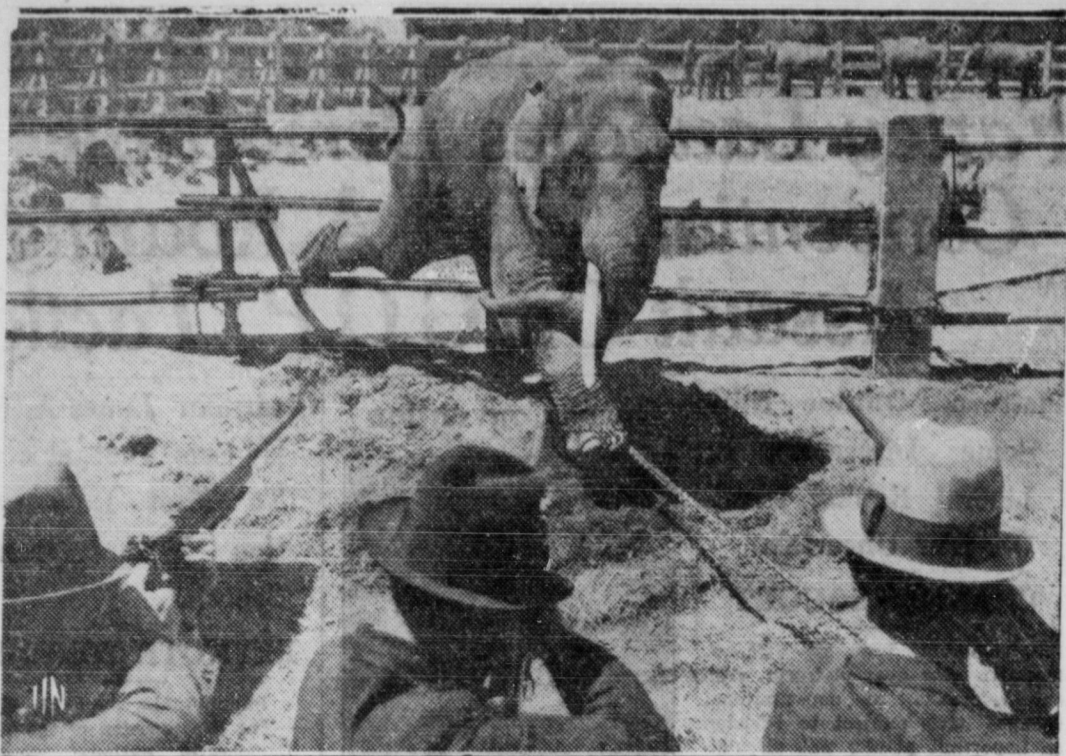


Firing Squad for Killer Elephant
