Don't know the details. . . All agree that Paramount is the original hard luck company. First, Margaret Sullivan breaks her arm, forcing the cancellation of the picture.

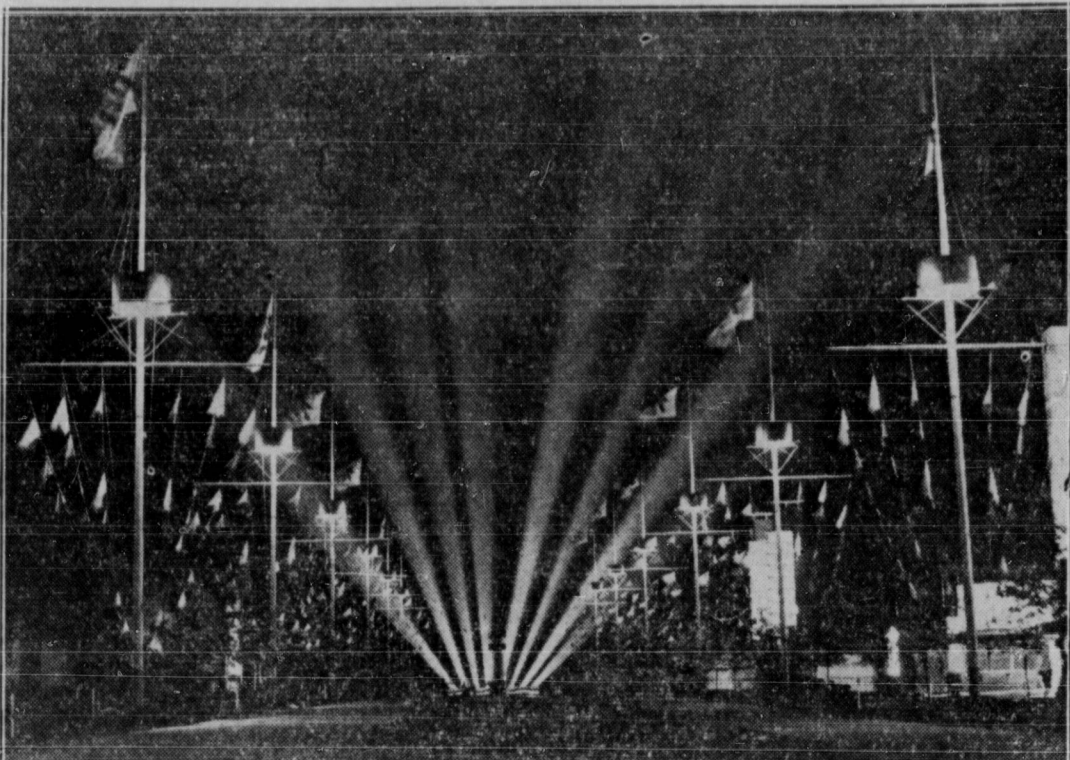
