IS OUTLINED

James A. Farley To Open  
National Headquarters  
August 1

Washington, July 9 (UPI)—New  
dealers are counting today upon  
organized and independent pro-  
gressive endorsement to offset  
the agrarian political bolt organ-  
ized by William Lemke, farm belt  
presidential candidate of the new-  
ly formed Union party. The ex-  
pected progressive endorsement of  
President Roosevelt would be a  
part of the continuing process of  
political party realignment which  
received tremendous impetus in  
the 1932 election.

Whether that endorsement will  
be sufficient to protect new deal  
political pastures against Lemke  
will depend somewhat upon next  
week's developments in Cleve-  
land. Dr. Francis E. Townsend,  
co-founder of old age revolving  
pensions, Inc., next Wednesday in  
that city will call to order the  
second annual Townsend conven-  
tion.

The Townsend meeting may be-  
come the medium of left wing po-  
litical mergers. It will afford an  
opportunity for Townsends to  
endorse Lemke, who already is  
backed by Father Charles E.  
Coughlin's national union for  
social justice. It may draw into  
the Lemke parade that remnant  
of the late Huey P. Long's po-  
litical army now captained by  
the Rev. Gerald L. K. Smith.


