WHITE SOX WIN EIGHT IN ROW

Chicago Sox Most Surprising Team In Major Leagues

New York, July 20.—(U.P.)—The revival of the Chicago White Sox, under the dynamic leadership of Jimmy Dykes, ranked as baseball's outstanding mid-season accomplishment today.

Since the "Black Sox" were banished from baseball late in 1920, no White Sox team has swept through the east with a record to equal the one just completed by the hustling pale hose. They won 11 out of 13 games, took every series and were on their way home today to open a 13-game stand at Comiskey Park with a winning streak of eight straight.

The Cleveland Indians also played at a dizzy clip during their eastern tour, winning 10 out of 12 games.

The White Sox were tied with the world champion Tigers today for fourth place, but only two games back of the second-place Indians. They were 11 games behind the league-leading Yankees, but not entirely out of the pennant race.

The White Sox blasted out a twin victory over the Philadelphia Athletics yesterday, 11-5 and 8-2, running their winning streak to eight in a row.

After winning the first game from Washington, 11-3, to run their winning streak to nine straight, dropped the second game, 9-5.

Lou Gehrig hit homers No. 27 and 28 as the New York Yankees divided a doubleheader with the St. Louis Browns, thereby failing to win a single series during their home stand against the western clubs. Red Ruffing fanned ten men and hit a homer as the Yanks won the opener, 10-3. The Browns beat Lefty Gomez in the second game, 9-5.

The Boston Red Sox battered Schoolboy Rowe and two other Detroit pitchers for 16 hits and a 12-3 triumph.

The St. Louis Cardinals took a doubleheader from the Boston Bees, 8-1, and 7-2, and trimmed the Chicago Cubs' lead in the National league to one game. Joe Medwick had a perfect day at bat, getting seven hits in seven trips in the two games.

After winning the first game in 11 innings, 2-1, the Chicago Cubs bowed to the Phillies in the afterpiece, 4-1.

The New York Giants divided a doubleheader with the Cincinnati Reds, and moved within one point of third place. The Giants won the opener, 4-3. A two-run rally in the ninth won the second game for the Reds, 2-2.

Brooklyn made it three straight over Pittsburgh, 4-2, with two of the Dodgers' runs scoring on one of Cy Blanton's wild pitches.

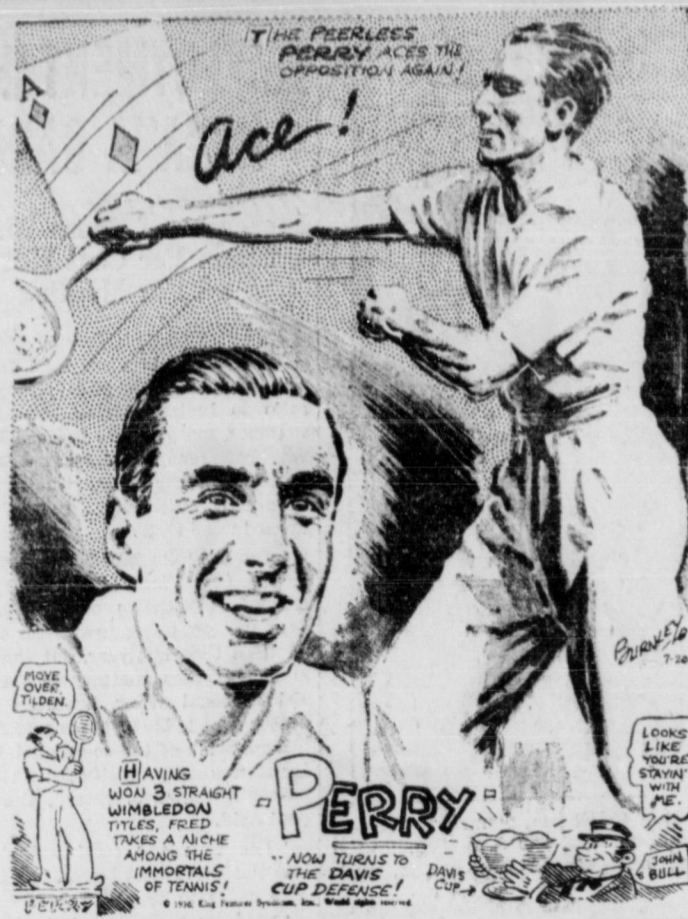

other places at the time on the night of the crime who she was supposed to have been home. Brown said she understood one witness told police he saw Wolner in a beer parlor about midnight Wednesday. "We realize we have a tough case on our hands", Brown said, shaking his head. "It's just as tough as the Titterton case in New York."

"It took the New York police force two weeks to solve that one

Held for questioning with Woolner were Miss Ward and Daniel Gaddy, middle aged hotel night watchman. Police said there was no apparent connection between the musician and Gaddy.

Revere" of the Spanish revolution in 1931 and brother of the present rebellion leader, said today that Spain will remain a republic regardless of who wins the present civil war.

"There is not a rebellion to restore the monarchy," he said. "It is a struggle over the social order and what kind of republic Spain is to have. I am sure that whatever happens, even if my brother's forces win they will never consider restoration of a king."

For his daring flight over Madrid in December, 1930, when he scattered thousands of leaflets proclaiming the advent of republican Spain, Franco was credited with touching the spark of popular fire which eventually blew the lid off the century old Bourbon dynasty in Spain.

Franco already was Spain's No. 1 aerial hero, sometimes called the "Lindbergh" of Spain for his transoceanic aviation exploits including a flight to Buenos Aires in 1926.

Today, as air attaché of the Spanish embassy he recalled the beginning of the original republican revolution in Spain and contrasted it with the present struggle.

Forest Fires Cause State \$3,861 Damage

Indianapolis, July 20.—Forest fires consumed 1,153 acres of Hoosier forest during a 37-day period, beginning July 1 and ending July 7, wrought \$3,861 worth of damage and were controlled at a suppression cost of \$244.31, according to reports received today by the department of conservation.

dollid were in the hands of the rebels, but claiming that the government controls the remainder of Spain.

Airplanes began to fly over the Montana barracks, where the rebels were holding out, at 6 a. m. and began a bombardment.

Socialists, militia and loyal storm guards surrounded the barracks and attacked it with artillery and rifles. At 11 a. m. the barracks surrendered.

(Refugees arriving at Gibraltar said more than 200 had been killed in fighting at La Linea, near Gibraltar.)

The Montana barracks is near the presidential palace and was the principal rebel stronghold, commanded by Gen Joaquin Fanjul. He surrendered.

Many Killed

Gibraltar, July 20.—(U.P.)—Bodies of more than 200 Spaniards, killed in a fight between army rebels and left wing forces, lay today in the streets of La Linea across the frontier, terror stricken refugees said.

They steamed up to the frontier gates after a night of dread in which the staccato rattle of machine gun fire left the streets dotted with killed and wounded as rebels consolidated their hold.

The refugees reported that a big force of loyal government troops was advancing toward the town to attack the rebels.

All night the gates of the Gibraltar reservation were closed. When they were opened at dawn there was a long queue of people awaiting admission. The normal British army guard was reinforced and the tombs stood with bayonets fixed on their rifles at the gates. They opened the gates just wide enough to admit one person at a time and each person was closely examined. The first man through was badly wounded.
