A visit to the White House, Friday January 15, at 4 o'clock, will be one of the high points of interest at the annual mid-winter meeting of the Board of Directors of the General Federation of Women's Clubs which will be held in Washington, D. C., January 13 to 17.

This gathering, which brings to the capital club leaders from every state in the Union, will be presided over by the president, Mrs. Roberta Campbell Lawson.
 Captain Willis S. Bryant, U. S. A., nationally known lecturer and author of the much discussed book,

"And It Shall Come to Pass" will address the board on "The Blindness of Man." Mr. Burton Marsh, Director of the Safety and Traffic Engineering Department of the Automobile Association, will be presented as a special speaker by Mrs. Edward Hammett, chairman of the Federation's Committee on Safety. Mrs. Phyllis Ferguson Hoyt, president of the National League of American Pen Women, will present a musical novelty, and Mrs. Harriet Ware Krumbhaar, one of the America's foremost composers, will speak on "Spiritual Values in Music." Mrs. Richmond Page of Philadelphia, recently returned from Puerto Rico, will discuss welfare work on the islands. Miss Alice Long, Chairman, International Relations Department, will tell of her visit to the International Peace Congress in Brussels. Highlights of the Federation's official cruise to the West Indies and Panama will be given by Mrs. Edward Dexter Knight, Mrs. William Dick Spornborg, and Mrs. Harvey W. Wiley. Mrs. Grace Morrison Poole, past president of the Federation, will tell of the trip she and a party of club leaders including Mrs. E. W. Shirk of California and Mrs. J. O. South of New Mexico, took to the South Seas, New Zealand, and Australia.

The formal reception preceding these programs will mark the opening of the Board meeting, bringing together the Board, members of Congress with their wives, and other leaders in the official and social life of the nation's Capital. A dinner at the Admiral will close the subscription contest of The CLUB WOMAN GFWC, official publication of the General Federation, at which time the Directors of the losing states will entertain the winning states.

quaintances who have offered their help apparently believed the boy would be returned safely within a short time. Today, however, there were obvious signs of discouragement and fear for his life.

The zero temperatures gave rise to many of the new fears that Charles may be suffering from exposure if he still lives. The light clothing he wore when he was carried from his home the night of Dec. 27 has been a source of constant concern.

Federal agents and police again withdrew from the case after a brief, unexplained early-morning foray yesterday. Four carloads of them left their hotel headquarters suddenly on a mysterious trip. When they returned they gave no hint as to the purpose of the mission. Dr. Mattson refused to comment on the incident.

to arise that would render forceful action necessary.

Not only is the government convinced, it was learned, that preparations for a big German expeditionary force in Spanish Morocco have been completed, but it is convinced also that Germany has

petrated deeply—and dangerously—into French Morocco. There were intimations that the government would intensify its insistence on a French-British naval blockade of Spain to enforce neutrality.

Newspapers, right and left wing organs for once united, talked vaguely of France "striking" to halt the alleged German penetration in Morocco.

Asserting that they had official, detailed reports of German troop activity in Spanish Morocco, and of preparations for troop landings on a big scale, spokesmen said with emphasis that France never would tolerate a German base in Morocco.

But it was learned on unimpeachable official authority also that the prime concern is not German infiltration into Spanish Morocco, but German infiltration into French Morocco.
