INAUGURAL EVE

Peace-time expenditures hit a
peak under Mr. Roosevelt in the
last fiscal year—\$8,879,000,000, but
government revenues are on the
upgrade, expenditures down. The
president has promised to balance
the budget and begin reducing the
national debt in the 1939 fiscal
year.

Mr. Roosevelt's central recovery
and reform policies, NRA and AAA,
were declared unconstitutional by
the courts. He demands now a
more liberal judicial interpretation
of the constitution. His gold pol-
icy survived court examination,
but most of the new deal legisla-
tion which has been reviewed by
the supreme court has been nullified.

Some observers date the
more substantial of new deal re-
covery from nullification of NRA
in January, 1935.

But, in any event, the country
is on the upgrade. The pump-
priming process of federal spend-
ing and expansion of credit now is
alarming those who foresee credit
and even possible currency infla-
tion as the outgrowth of an expansion
of business recovery to boom-
time proportions.

The precedent breaking tempo
of the Roosevelt administration
goes on. It has been maintained
from the stirring week-end of his
inauguration, which ended with
every bank in the nation closed,
through the famous "hundred days
of congress" to the present moment
when Mr. Roosevelt is preparing
to become the first chief
executive to be inaugurated under
the 20th amendment to the consti-
tution. That amendment advanced
the inauguration from March 4 to
January 20.

Mr. Roosevelt smashed his first
presidential precedent before tak-
ing office. He flew from New York
to Chicago in 1932 to accept the
Democratic nomination the day after
it was tendered. His accept-
ance speech smashed hard at the
Hoover administration, denounced
prohibition and promised its repeal,
but concealed the program of ex-
perimental legislation which he
and a brain trust of young intel-
lectuals had devised for the nation's
ills.

Experts differ on the period at
which depression was at its depth.
But economic disorders rose to-
ward spectacular and quick climax in
mid-February of 1933 when the
governor of Michigan proclaimed
a bank holiday. Within a fort-
night the financial disease was
epidemic and Mr. Roosevelt's first
business on the Sunday after his
Saturday, March 4 inauguration,
was to proclaim a national bank
holiday.

Business, big and little, was
shouting for relief. From hotel to
mansion a nation looked to Wash-
ington for what was coming next.

The week of March 4 to March 11
is without precedent in this capital
for fearful excitement. There was
none of the glamorous, patriotic
relief of marching men and bands
such as accompany a war. And
on Sunday, March 12 Mr. Roose-
velt invited a nation to listen to
him from the White House in the
first of his fireside chats. With a
few words he was performing a
psychological miracle—

"My friends, I want to talk for
a few minutes with the people of
the United States about banking—
perfectly sound assets—panic
prices—legislation promptly and
patriotically passed by congress—
no sound bank is a dollar worse
than it was—I hope you can
see from this elemental recital—
confidence and courage—you peo-
ple."
