Development of a new industry—the production of tung oil—promises to figure importantly in the economic recovery of the south. Thousands of acres are being planted to tung trees whose blossoms yield the valuable black-brown nuts which produce tung oil. This commodity is used in manufacture of paints and numerous other lines. Until a few years ago China had a monopoly on tung oil since it was thought that the trees flourished only in the Orient, but recent experimentation proved the suitable conditions of the gulf coast states.

Washington studied personnel of a joint American-Philippine committee to study the economic advisability of granting the islands their complete freedom from the U. S. in 1938 or 1939 instead of July 4, 1946, as now provided by congress. President Quezon desires the earlier date and has been discussing trade relations with this country with government experts with a view to placing the Philippine national economy on a sound basis to speed the event. Paul V. McNutt, new high commissioner to the islands, discussed the situation here with Mr. Roosevelt Saturday night. The president's position was not revealed.

The president acted, however, to complete the staff McNutt will take with him when he sails April 3. Mr. Roosevelt named Leo M.

Gardner, Indianapolis, former state legislator, as McNutt's legal adviser and Wayne Coy, Delphi, Ind., WPA administrator, as his personal aide.

Although the Philippine trip has not advanced to the stage where White House aides are blocking out an itinerary, it was believed the president would travel from Washington to either San Francisco or Los Angeles, route depending on the time of year.

Mr. Roosevelt would travel the 7,164 miles from the west coast to Manila on a navy battleship, probably stopping briefly at Honolulu. The whole trip would cover slightly more than 20,000 miles.

If made, the Philippines would be the eleventh foreign country of distant American possession Mr. Roosevelt has visited since becoming president. He has been in Canada, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Brazil, Argentina, Uruguay, Trinidad, Bahamas, Colombia, and Hawaii.

Mr. Roosevelt enjoyed himself so much driving in the bright sun-

shine yesterday that he said he may stay at the Warm Springs Foundation until Friday instead of leaving Wednesday as originally planned.

Coy Appointed
Indianapolis, Mar. 22 — (U.P.) — Wayne Coy, appointed administrative assistant to Paul V. McNutt, high commissioner to the Philippines, said today he would confer with Prosecutor Herbert Spencer before planning his departure.

Spencer is conducting prosecution of Joel A. Baker and Peter Cancelli on charges of assaulting Coy in a statehouse corridor during the recent legislative session.

known as the Eli Myer farm in Blue Creek township, also offered for sale, was charged \$2,851.07. This amount was divided as follows: principal, \$2,000; interest, \$564.99; delinquent taxes, \$286.12.
