lives for this experiment. Mr. Kissinger survived the ordeal and was discharged from army service as a well man. Later he became helpless. For 12 years he went about in a wheel chair. He can now walk, but can not do much physical work.

Repeated efforts made to reach the ears of Congress for a pension, were not answered until at the request of President Calvin Coolidge, an annual sum of money was appropriated for his maintenance. In the meantime, patriotic organizations raised sufficient funds to purchase a home for him and his wife.
