Q. What makes moss grow on some lawns, and how can it be eradicated?

A. It indicates an impoverished soil condition, poor drainage, or too much shade. It does not necessarily indicate an acid soil, as it grows where lime has been used abundantly. When moss occurs scattered in small patches and there is a uniform but weak growth of grass, liberal fertilizing will usually increase the vigor of the grass, which will crowd out the moss. Sprinkling patches of moss liberally with ammonium sulphate is effective in destroying it. Larke patches can be raked out and the bare areas fertilized and reseeded.
