This makes a total available for distribution of \$244,053.05.

A sum of \$685.17 is not to be given to taxing units. Included in this is \$520 paid to special judges and \$165.17 to be given county treasurer Jeff Lechty as his fees on delinquent collections. This leaves a final balance of \$243,367.88 to go to taxing units.

The distribution to the various funds of the county, state, city and township units as a whole is shown in the accounting.

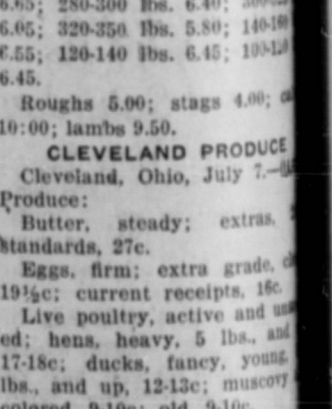
