Habanellos Drop Exhibition Tilt On Passed Ball Thursday

Habanellos dropped a 2-1 decision to Zollner Pistons of Fort Wayne Thursday night at the South Ward diamond in one of the closest games of the season.

The winning run scored in the seventh on an error, a walk and a passed ball with two out and two strikes on the batter.

Zollner scored its first run in the opening inning on a hit and an error. Two hits enabled Habanellos to tie the count in the second inning. Each team obtained only three hits.

In the regular county league game, Cloverleaf registered a 6-3 triumph over Blue Creek, bunching five hits to good advantage. Two walks and a hit accounted for two

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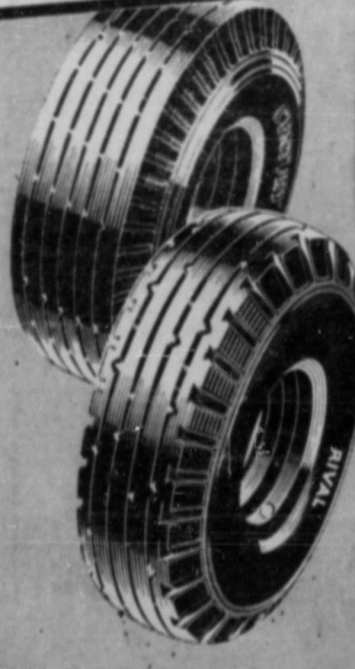

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DEAN SUFFERS FIRST DEFEAT OF THE SEASON

Pirates Defeat Cubs; Brooklyn-Giants Series Opens Today

New York, July 7.—(U.P.)—The bitterest cut-throat baseball series in years was anticipated in the Giants-Dodgers set-to of four games in three days opening in Brooklyn today.

As an outgrowth of the Zeke Bonura-Lee Durocher brawl last week and Larry MacPhail's accusing Bill Terry of "intimidating umpires and trying to run the National league," the riot squad of the police department will be on hand and plainclothesmen will be distributed through the stands. All bottled drinks will be served in paper cups. The Brooklyn club has posted signs around the stands calling for fair play and threatening prosecution for ungentlemanly acts.

"Any one spotted hurling fire-crackers or a bottle on the field will be promptly arrested," it announced.

There's more bitterness in the feud than any attempt to drum up business. Bonura has said that two regular infielders and one regular outfielder on the Brooklyn club told him he should have given Manager Durocher a lacing for stepping on his foot in their imbroglio at the Polo Grounds. Durocher rested himself especially for the Giant series, and he isn't one to drop any argument.

More fuel was poured on the fire last night when Cincinnati knocked off the Cardinals, 7-4, and enabled the Dodgers to climb into third place above St. Louis. The Dodgers now trail the second-place Giants by only 2 1/2 games and can take over the runner-up spot by winning four straight. The series was expected to draw 100,000.

Paul Derringer, extending his "control pitching" to 43 2-3 consecutive innings without walking a man, led the Reds to triumph, increasing their lead to 5 1/2 games. Although rapped for 14 hits, Derringer was great in the pinches, winning No. 11. A crowd of 29,195 attended the game at Cincinnati.

Pittsburgh took over fifth place by beating the Cubs, 7-2. Dizzy Dean was knocked out of the box in the fourth and charged with his first defeat. Fern Bell's triple with the bases packed in the eighth clinched the game.

The White Sox moved into the first division of the American league by winning their fifth straight—an 8-1 triumph over Cleveland, which dropped the Indians into fifth place. Jack Knott held the tribe to five hits while the White Sox knocked Johnny Allen out of the box in the second inning and collected 12 hits off four Cleveland moundsmen. Gerald Walker hit a triple and homer.

A four-run rally in the eighth, started by Roy Cullenbine, enabled Detroit to trim the Browns, 9-5. Cullenbine, York and Greenberg made three hits each in the Tigers' 15-hit attack on four Brown hurlers.

George Caster snapped the Athletics' five-game losing streak last night in Philadelphia when he beat the Senators, 9-3, before 8,732. Caster gave up eight hits and held the Senators at bay except in the second, when they made all their runs.

Yesterday's hero—Bob Klingler, Pittsburgh right-hander, who scored his seventh victory by beating Dizzy Dean and the Cubs, 7-2.

Today's Sport Parade

New York, July 7.—(U.P.)—Jimmy Johnston, the man who talks so much that occasionally he pickets himself as "being unfair to his own ears," broke the American record for volubility yesterday when arrangements were completed for a Joe Louis-Bob Pastor championship fight.

At 11:27 a. m. when, as Pastor's manager, he was told the bout was definite for September, Johnston started talking in the precise language of the Liverpool docks, where he received his formal education, and did not stop until he had worn out seven sets of listeners.

The topic of his filibuster was Bob Pastor. As a member of the seventh group of listeners I missed his description of Pastor's birth, Pastor's kindergarten days, Pastor's courtship, and Pastor's marriage, but was present for his discussion of Pastor's coming fight with Louis.

Johnston wants the fight to be held in Detroit, as he tersely explained in 10,000 words.

"I want it in Detroit," he said without a pause for station identification, "because I can get fair deal there, and I can't in New York under the present boxing commission. The New York commissioners don't like me and what I think about them wouldn't look good even if printed with invisible ink. If I had my way about it I wouldn't even let them have tickets to the fight. It is a waste of good cardboard, because they know so little about fighting they can't appreciate what they see."

In another cut outburst of 5,000 words Johnston said he planned to ask the Michigan boxing com-

mission, provided the fight was held in that state, to make it a finish fight.

"There is no limit to how long a fight can go in that state," Johnston said, "and that's the way it should be. Ten and 15 round fights are for sissies. My Pastor is a man and can fight all day and night if necessary. A fight of 20 or 25 rounds would suit him fine."

Several listeners tried to interrupt Johnston and ask him if he thought Pastor could run backwards for 20 to 25 rounds, but there was no breaking through his barrage of words. From the subject of the distance the fight should go he moved into a discussion of the referee without so much as a second's pause.

"In Michigan I wouldn't have to take Arthur Donovan," Johnston said, "and heaven knows I don't want Donovan in the ring at a fight I'm interested in. He referred the first Pastor-Louis and what a job he did."

"You won't believe it, but he said that once during the fight he thought of throwing Pastor out of the ring for running and dodging Louis. That would have been a fine thing, wouldn't it, to disqualify a fighter because he didn't nail himself down and let his opponent crack him on the jaw?"

While Johnston wants the fight scheduled for 20 or more rounds, he thinks there is a fine chance that Pastor will knock out Louis in the first round.

"Galento would have flattened him in the first if he had been smart," Johnston said. "Remember when Tony nailed Joe with those two left hooks? Well, if instead of trying to land another left he had feinted with his left, which Louis was afraid of and watching, and the crooked right, Galento would be champion today. Pastor never would have missed an opportunity like that. He would have finished Joe off right there. Let me tell you this, boys . . ."

Grudge Races To Be Set-tled In Weekly Junk Car Derby
