

U. S. Wheat Markets Shrink



A problem facing U. S. farmers in 1941 is the great reduction in wheat export outlets, as shown by the chart above. U. S. Department of Agriculture officials point out that continued acreage adjustment under the AAA Program is necessary to balance wheat supply with decreased demand.





Doesn't that sound like the sort of normal dinner any family would find it easy to take? You'd never suspect it of being a health meal, would you? Yet it's crammed full of vitamins, minerals and other food elements that are necessary for good health.

There's Vitamin in The Foods You Like

Lots of people seem to think that vitamins and minerals are as dreary as gray flannel . . . and that they are found only in the least enjoyable of foods, prepared in the most monotonous and uninteresting ways. This has always seemed to me most unfortunate . . . because vitamins and minerals are in lots of thoroughly enjoyable foods too. Bananas, oranges, apples, lean pork, cheese, eggs, milk, cream, butter, white potatoes, sweet potatoes, tomatoes, green peppers and strawberries . . . as well as in the spinach, cabbage, carrots, liver and prunes we're continually being told are "good for us".

However, these less popular foods can be made tempting and pleasant to eat. Their bad reputation is largely due to a lack of understanding and poor cooking.

Easy and Economical Too

But we'll discuss this more thoroughly some other time. Right now we are interested in this dinner, which in addition to being healthful and enjoyable, is also easy to prepare and decidedly economical.

It's a "top-of-the-stove" dinner. You won't need the oven. The dessert is one that can be prepared in the morning, because there is quite a little to look after at the last minute with the dumplings and the corn . . . so we don't want to be distracted with making a dessert too.

Here is the recipe for the Pork and Dumplings:

FAVORITE PORK AND DUMPLINGS

Buy 6 pork steaks (or chops). Brown these on both sides in a hot skillet with a little cut up onion for flavor. Season well with salt and pepper. Add just enough water to cover the bottom of the pan, and cook over low heat until the meat is tender . . . about 45 minutes.

Add more water so that there will be plenty of steam to cook the dumplings, and also sufficient liquid for gravy. In the meantime make your dumplings.

Dumplings

2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
½ tsp. salt
4 tsp. baking powder

1 tbsp. shortening
½ to 1 cup milk

Sift the flour, baking powder and salt together. Cut in the shortening with a pastry blender or two knives. Add the milk to make a soft dough and drop by spoonfuls on the meat. Be sure that the liquid is boiling at this time.

Now cover tightly and cook for 15 to 18 minutes without lifting the cover.

Remove the meat and dumplings to a hot serving platter and keep hot while preparing the gravy.

For Gravy

Stir a little flour-and-water paste into the liquid in the skillet. Cook until thickened . . . stirring constantly. Season with salt and pepper, if desired. Pour the gravy around the meat and dumplings on the platter, and serve immediately.

This makes 6 servings.

NOTICE OF PETITION FOR AND DETERMINATION TO ISSUE BONDS

The taxpayers of Kirkland School Township of Adams County and Kirkland Township of Adams County are hereby notified that a petition has been filed in the Court of Common Pleas of Adams County for the issuance of bonds in the amount of \$25,000 for the purpose of providing funds to be used in paying the cost of construction and equipment of a school building addition to be located on the grounds of High School; also, to authorize the issuance of the bonds of said Civil Township for the purpose of providing funds to be used in paying the cost of construction and equipment of a new school building addition which is to be used for school and general township community purposes as provided in Chapter 51, Acts of 1931. Remonstrances against either or both of said bond issues may be filed with the Advisory Board in the manner and time provided by Chapter 119 in the Acts of 1931.

The taxpayers of said School and Civil Township are further notified that the Advisory Board did on the 25th day of March, 1941, determine to issue the bonds of said school township in the amount of \$21,000 for the construction serially over a period of fifteen years, and the bonds of the Civil Township in the amount of \$26,600.00, maturing serially over a period of twenty years, for the purpose of providing funds to be used as above stated. Said bonds to bear interest at a rate not exceeding three and one-half per cent per annum to be determined by bidding.

Both of said bond issues may be made by ten or more taxpayers filing a petition in the office of the Auditor of Adams County within the time and in the manner provided by law. The petition will be heard and considered by the State Board of Tax Commissioners in the manner provided by law.
