**RUSSIAN ARMIES**

tov was set afire during the evacuation and that six other Russian vessels were sunk or damaged. Finnish troops were reported moving into the Hangoe area.

Stockholm believed the Russian action was part of a coordinated military-diplomatic maneuver by Russia and Britain designed to squeeze the Finns out of the war or produce a full British war declaration against them.

Sweden believed Russia is evacuating all Finnish territory back to the line of the 1939 frontier. Hangoe is the chief Finnish point still held by the Russians except for Fisherman's peninsula in the Arctic.

London reported that Britain has set a deadline of midnight Friday for a declaration of war not only against Finland but against Germany's other allies, Rumania and Hungary.

London said there was a possi-

bility that a last minute Finnish message to Britain, transmitted by way of Washington, might delay the war declaration.

Russia was said to have advised London that she regards the war declaration as a test of Britain's sincerity in the Anglo-Russian alliance.

The explosion at Uzice was blamed by the official German news agency and by the Belgrade newspaper Obnova on "communists" who had established a large munitions depot in the vaults of the former Jugoslav National bank at Uzice.

According to the Jugoslav middle east headquarters at Cairo three German divisions of about 30,000 men were reported fighting on a "third front" against guerrillas in the valley of the western Morava river.
