In taking Selisharovo the Russians had broken the so-called second German winter defense line in a new place and the capture of Rzhev would be calculated to smash the entire line northwest of Moscow.

Several other towns were recaptured yesterday, the night communiqué said.

A special communiqué reported that between Jan. 6 and yesterday the Germans had lost more than 14,000 men killed, including one general.

Radio Moscow broadcast reports of fierce fighting on the Finnish front, centering in the vital Karelian Isthmus north of Leningrad and said the Finns had lost more than 1,000 men, in a vain stand at "the important populated center of V."

The Russians attacked with the bayonet, it was said, and forced the Finns to retreat hastily.
