News Of The World

Newport News, Va., The U. S. navy struck back with all available warships and airplanes today to eliminate the German submarine menace along the Atlantic seaboard where four oil tankers have been sunk within the past six days.

Singapore—Australian troops aided by Indians have counter-attacked the Japanese and have cleaned them out of an important area south of the Muar river on the West Malaya front, dispatches reported today.

London—Russian forces are reported opening a major drive on the Leningrad front where they have pierced the German line at several points east of the city. Stockholm dispatches said today. Russian and German troops were reported fighting one of the fiercest battles of the war at Moshalsk, 60 miles west of Moscow.
