Judging from the number of
blue and white tags on the cars
parked on the streets, there are a
lot of owners who haven't purchas-
ed the '42 plates. The deadline
will be February 28th, two weeks
from Saturday. Don't wait for the
final rush if you can avoid it.

Every firm can help by insisting
on the system of payroll savings
for defense bonds and those who
qualify are entitled to fly a "blue
flag, with a minute man in white,
surrounded by white stars." Only
firms where ninety percent or more
of the employees have signed for
bonds, can obtain such a flag.

All aliens who came from Italy,
Germany or Japan and who are not
naturalized, must apply at the near-
est first or second class post office
for identification papers, between
now and the 28th. It's a federal
requirement and the penalties for
not doing this are severe. It is
done to protect those who are
worthy as well as a precaution dur-
ing war time.

Tin cans are going to be scarce
and precious. The War Production
Board has banned them for pack-
ing tobacco, beer, coffee, pork and
beans, dog food and oils. They will
be used for canning foods, juices
and vegetables. The metal is dif-
ficult to obtain these days and
what can be had is badly needed
for war production, necessitating
the elimination of all uses not
necessary.

The Decatur Chamber of Com-
merce would like to have three
hundred members this year.

facturer, shop man, teacher, law-
yer, preacher, doctor or otherwise
engaged, you are welcome and will
find a place to serve your com-
munity. The slogan for 1942 is
"The greater the number, the bet-
ter the service." Be a part of De-

The national Red Cross fund has
been increased to \$65,000,000 to
meet the many demands. This
means that the quota for Adams
county will be \$7,800 instead of the
original \$6,000. The latter has
been more than subscribed and

those in charge will continue the
campaign until the additional sum
has been raised. The response
here has been wonderful and of-
ficers of the chapter are hopeful of
ultimate and complete success.

They are not using any red tape
in Australia these days. Over
there where the threat of Japanese
invasion becomes more acute each
day, an order has been issued that
calls to the colors, every man able
to shoulder a gun. There are no
restrictions as to age, color or
creed, no requirements for physical
perfection, nothing but the plain
order. Business is being turned
over to the women and the men
will fight for the land they love.

The war news is not encourag-
ing, but neither is it surprising.
With superior forces and equip-
ment, with a long start in prepa-
ration, the Japs have met with
heavy losses but kept on. They
will be entrenched in important
points, which means it will be
more difficult to dislodge them, but
when we have completed plans
and with men, planes, tanks, guns
and ships, increasing daily, we will
some day, perhaps in a few months,
turn the tide on the yellow forces
from the rising sun country. Then
the news will be brighter. In the
meantime, it's up to every one to
save, to buy bonds, to unite for
victory. It's sure to come.

About the only duty of the lieut-
enant-governor in Indiana, as set-
up at present, other than presiding
over the state senate when in ses-
sion, is operation of the state fair.
The state board of agriculture has
abolished the post of fair manager,
held by Paul Dunn, secretary to
Lieutenant-Governor Dawson and
the latter now is considering re-
signing as commissioner of agri-
culture. It seems to be a part of
the inside scrap among Republi-
cans in power in the state house,
due to unconstitutional legislation
enacted in the 1941 session. Guy
Cantwell was named by the board
as secretary and under present
plans, will have charge of the fair.

An expression of the state's ap-
preciation for the services render-
ed by members of local rationing
boards was sent to the 339 persons
who are serving on 99 different
boards by Governor Henry F.
Schricker. In personal letters ad-
dressed to the various board mem-
bers, the Governor praised "the un-
selfish and intelligent service
which you are rendering to Indi-
ana, to your local community, and
to the nation." He also stated, "I
am expressing the general public's
reaction when I say that the efforts
of the local boards have resulted
in the operation of a difficult pro-
gram without confusion and with a
smoothness hardly believed possi-
ble five weeks ago."

Boy Scout Week Was Big Success:

The Boy Scouts of America, re-
sponding to the keynote, "strong
for America," are concluding a
week's celebration, observing the
thirty-second birthday of the won-
derful organization. The whole
nation has assisted, with thanks
that Scouting exists.

With due ceremonies, the occa-
sion was observed here and honors
paid to those scouts and their
masters who have made particu-
larly good showings or advanced
to a new grade. The aim and pur-
pose of scouting, character and
citizenship, are the aim and pur-
pose also of every Democracy.
Without these, we would have a
dictatorship. We owe much to
those men who have given of their
time and abilities to teach the boys
good lessons, keep them interested
and thus help to prepare them for
a more serviceable manhood.
