Here is America's No. 1 one-man army, Captain Arthur W. Wermuth of Chicago, who is reported to have killed 116 Japanese soldiers and captured many more as a member of the 57th Filipino Scout regiment attached to General Douglas MacArthur's valiant forces on the Bataan peninsula in the Philippines. Wermuth, who once played football for Northwestern Military academy at Lake Geneva, Wis., has won the Silver Star for gallantry, the Distinguished Service Cross for extraordinary heroism and the Purple Heart with two clasps. Wounded three times, he is said to have spent more time behind the Japanese lines than the American. Stories of his exploits and daring read like movie serial thrillers.
