




If you have volunteered for any of the patriotic services, you'll find it very important to have comfortable feet. There is now a complete war-time shoe wardrobe, three of the models from which are shown above. At the left is an AWVS shoe in smooth flag blue calfskin. It is an ankle-fitting oxford that harmonizes with all the uniforms designed for the distaff side of the Civilian Defense army. It is well-made, with an inner and outer sole for greater comfort and protection. Center, the young air raid warden is wearing a crushed leather oxford for comfort during hours of patrol duty. It has only three eyelets to facilitate dressing in a hurry, extra breadth across the ball of the foot, and snugly fitting heels. The shoe, right, is for work in the motor corps and all automobile driving. It is a sturdy oxford with a ventilated vamp made of crushed calfskin with an extra eyelet at the ankle for a super-snug fit. These shoes were designed by Julius Grossman, noted shoe designer.

existing and future issues, by requiring husband and wife to file a joint return and through plugging other so-called loopholes in present laws.

The treasury requested authority to collect part of the individual income taxes at the source—up to 10 percent of the taxable portion of salaries. Treasury officials said this withholding form of collection might be put into effect next July 1 which would result in most taxpayers paying on two year's taxes at the same time—the final two payments of taxes on 1941 income in addition to the levy on current earnings.

Under the treasury's new proposals, a married person with two dependents having a net income of \$3,000 would pay \$15 income tax, compared with \$58 under the present law. A single person with the same income would pay \$470, compared with the present \$221.

The pocketbooks of all Americans, except the very poor, would be hit by the administration's new taxes. Persons in the lower and middle income brackets would bear the brunt of the increases in individual taxes for two reasons. The rates on the wealthy already are high and treasury experts also figured that anti-inflationary aims of the program could be attained only by "mopping up" part of the surplus earnings of persons with incomes under \$15,000.

Morgenthau warned that the

United States is confronted with "a grave threat of inflation."

"We should, therefore, tax so as to withdraw the greatest possible volume of purchasing power at this time, when money incomes are high and the quantity of goods for civilian use is shrinking day by day because of the demands of our war effort," he said. "... the way to prevent inflation is to prevent people from engaging in the futile effort to buy more goods than can be produced."

The treasury secretary recommended that congress also raise another \$2,000,000,000 more a year by extending the social security program and payments. The proposed new taxes and social security payments would increase federal revenues by more than \$9,000,000,000 a year and reach the goal of \$27,000,000,000 set by President Roosevelt in his budget message.

Morgenthau urged attainment of this goal "not as the maximum but as the very least that the American people can afford to provide at this critical time."

He reiterated opposition to a general sales tax because "it bears disproportionately on the low income groups whose incomes are almost wholly spent on consumer goods" and "increases prices and mankles price control more difficult."

Personal exemptions for income tax purposes and normal tax rates for both individuals and corporations would not be changed.

The surtax rates on individual incomes would be increased sharply.

Excess profits and corporation taxes would be increased and a war surtax added.

The earned income credit on individual returns would be abolished.

There is a toleration of low standards in high places.
