In the past, labor has been opposed to such a drastic measure. Another target of high union leaders has been the war labor board's little steel wage formula.

And this noon chairman William Davis of the WLB told the senate banking committee that the little steel formula will be adhered to in future wage disputes if the government continues

food subsidies. Davis told the committee that wages and prices can be held under control if the present price and stabilization programs are continued. The senate committee is now considering a one-year extension of the programs beyond their June 30 termination date. Another war program, lend-lease, apparently is getting its extension without much trouble. The house foreign affairs committee today unanimously recommended that the program be continued until July 1, 1945. However, the committee tacked on an amendment which would make congress the last judge of settlements between the United States and beneficiary nations after the war.

While we're on the subject of post-war problems, the government's petroleum reserve corporation reports that the center of gravity for oil production is shifting to the middle east. The report says the potential resources of any of the four companies operating in the middle east could supply world needs for many years to come.

The report makes no mention of the controversial Arabian oil pipeline which the petroleum reserves corporation is planning to finance. A senate committee is starting to investigate the government's domestic and foreign oil policies.

Some Capitol Hill sources may not want the government to go into the oil business, but the war food administration announces that the government is going back into the butter market for the first time since September.

During April, butter manufacturers will be required to reserve 10 percent of their production for purchase by the armed forces. But the WFA estimates that with butter production climbing seasonally, civilian supplies in April should be as large as they are this month.

From the White House today comes the report that President

Roosevelt's cold is decidedly better. But for the fourth successive day he stayed away from his office.

Secretary Morgenthau today set the goal of the fifth war loan drive at \$14,000,000,000, an increase of \$2,000,000,000 over the last drive's goal. No definite starting date has been set, but unofficial reports say the new drive will begin in late May or early June.
