The senate military affairs committee meets tomorrow to consider general demobilization measures covering expansion of unemployment compensation benefits, transportation and maintenance payments for war workers and veterans during training for peacetime jobs, and disposal of surplus government war properties. Committee chairman Robert R. Reynolds, D. N. C., said he hoped to have such legislation ready for the senate within 10 days. George estimated that his bill would affect more than 2,000,000 federal workers not now covered by the regular federal retirement program or the federal-state unemployment compensation system.

Plane Production To Reach 100,000 Goal

Washington Aug. 2—(UP)—Aircraft production this year will reach its goal of 100,000 planes, government officials indicated in disclosing that 60,000 bombers, fighters and other types of planes were turned out by American factories during the first seven months of 1944. Charles E. Wilson, chairman of the aircraft production board, reported that schedules for the next five months have been trimmed to about 8,274 planes a month, which will bring the year's total to about 101,000.

Beef Steaks, Roasts To Be Point Free

Washington, Aug. 2—(UP)—The office of price administration by August 13 will make steaks and roasts of utility grades of beef ration-free but will return hams and porkloins to the ration list. It was learned today. Informal sources revealed that war food administrator Marvin Jones also will order steaks and roasts from the better commercial grade of beef removed from rationing controls by Sept. 1, a move that would make virtually all types of beef point free. Remaining grades go primarily to the armed forces or to restaurants and hotels, rarely to the butcher shops.

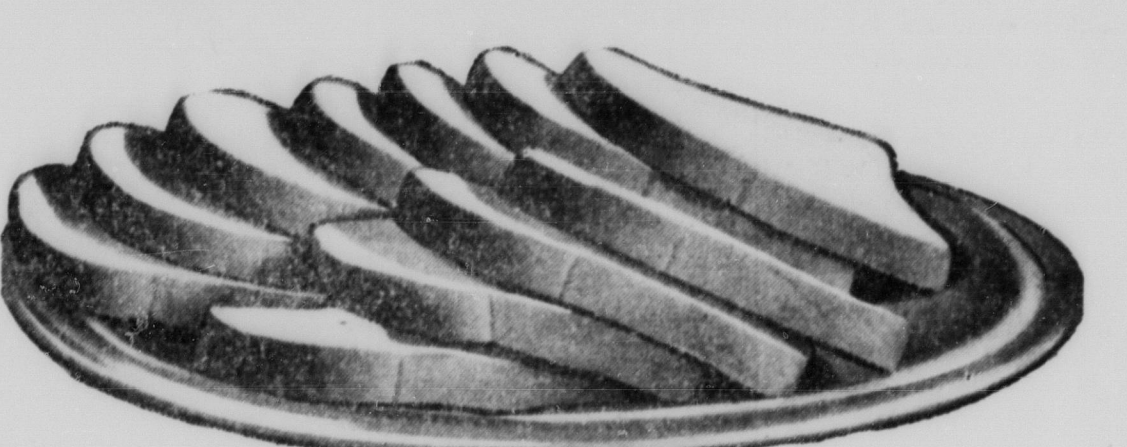
New Castle Girl Fatally Injured

BOLOGNA CORNUCOPIAS

1 pound bologna • 3 cups soft bread crumbs
• ½ teaspoon salt • 2 tablespoons minced onion • ½ cup diced celery • ⅓ cup melted butter, margarine or clear drippings • ½ cup water or evaporated milk • 1 cup tomato juice

Fold single slices of bologna to form a cornucopia. Fasten each with a toothpick. Combine crumbs, salt, onion and celery. Add fat to warm milk and pour over the bread mixture. Fill cornucopia, place in a shallow baking pan. Pour tomato juice over bologna. Bake in oven (400° F.) 15 to 20 min. Serves 6.

SPINACH RING

3 tablespoons butter or margarine • 3 tablespoons flour • 1 cup milk • ½ lb. cheese • 3 eggs, beaten • 1 cup finely chopped cooked spinach • 1½ cups soft bread crumbs • Salt, pepper • 2 cups hot mashed potatoes • Hot seasoned beets

Make a sauce with the butter or margarine, flour and milk. When thickened and smooth add the cheese. Remove from the heat and stir until it is melted. Add the eggs, thoroughly drained spinach, crumbs and seasonings to taste. Pour into greased ring mold and bake in moderate oven, 350°, 40 to 50 min. Unmold on serving plate. Fill center with hot mashed potatoes; garnish plate with beets.
