around San Michele and San Andrea—both of which were held by the 8th army—were reported less than five miles from Florence.

East of highway two, British guardmen stabbed out toward German-held Impruneta, 5½ miles south of Florence, and in the mountains just west of highway 69 other British forces advanced through relatively weak opposition to occupy Sezzate, 8½ miles southeast of Florence.

The senate military affairs committee meets tomorrow to consider general demobilization measures covering expansion of unemployment compensation benefits, transportation and maintenance payments for war workers and veterans during training for peacetime jobs, and disposal of surplus government war properties.

Committee chairman Robert R. Reynolds, D. N. C., said he hoped to have such legislation ready for the senate within 10 days.

George estimated that his bill would affect more than 2,000,000 federal workers not now covered by the regular federal retirement program or the federal-state unemployment compensation system.

Fort Wayne War Ace Is Sued For Divorce

Lt. Louis E. Curdes, Fort Wayne's first war ace, who was shot down in France and later escaped to be returned to the United States, has been sued for divorce by his wife, Norma Curdes of Fort Wayne, who charges incompatibility. She also alleges that the defendant has been guilty of other misconduct, the nature of which will be disclosed at the time of the trial.





BOLOGNA CORNUCOPIAS

1 pound bologna • 3 cups soft bread crumbs • ½ teaspoon salt • 2 tablespoons minced onion • ½ cup diced celery • 1/3 cup melted butter, margarine or clear drippings • ½ cup water or evaporated milk • 1 cup tomato juice



Fold single slices of bologna to form a cornucopia. Fasten each with a toothpick. Combine crumbs, salt, onion and celery. Add fat to warm milk and pour over the bread mixture. Fill cornucopia, place in a shallow baking pan. Pour tomato juice over bologna. Bake in oven (400° F.) 15 to 20 min. Serves 6.



SPINACH RING

3 tablespoons butter or margarine • 3 tablespoons flour • 1 cup milk • ½ lb. cheese • 3 eggs, beaten • 1 cup finely chopped cooked spinach • 1½ cups soft bread crumbs • Salt, pepper • 2 cups hot mashed potatoes • Hot seasoned beets

Make a sauce with the butter or margarine, flour and milk. When thickened and smooth add the cheese. Remove from the heat and stir until it is melted. Add the eggs, thoroughly drained spinach, crumbs and seasonings to taste. Pour into greased ring mold and bake in moderate oven, 350°, 40 to 50 min. Unmold on serving plate. Fill center with hot mashed potatoes; garnish plate with beets.
