simply that the Japanese war will last long after the European war is over.

Armchair strategists attempting to judge the approach of Germany's unconditional surrender should consider these factors:

1. Except in the south where the port of Marseilles is open and relatively undamaged, the vast Al-

lied armies in France are being supplied through Cherbourg, an inferior port, and "over the beach." The Allied thrust in the west urgently requires the capture of Brest and its clearance for traffic. Next in importance to Brest would be the port of Antwerp, in Belgium, which could supply the British armies fighting through the lowlands. Le Havre is believed to have been wrecked beyond quick repair.

2. Consolidation of the Allied position in France requires a firm joining and amalgamation of the invasion forces which hit France from the south and speeded up the Rhone valley with the invasion forces that hit from the west near Cherbourg.

3. Any German collapse within the next three or four weeks would almost inevitably have to be accompanied by substantial destruction of German armies in Italy and by a major Red army offensive in the vicinity of Warsaw.

Given those conditions and favorable breaks in their development, the soundest judgment here is that organized resistance in Germany might be crushed by Oct. 1. It is suggested that those factors be kept in mind when estimating the full significance of new bridgeheads across the Moselle, the capture of Liege and what appears to be the collapse of organized German resistance before the American 1st army in southeastern Belgium.

Liege to within 18 miles of the Nazi frontier, crossing the Meuse and taking the town of Romsee.

The Americans also forced a new bridgehead over the Meuse just west of Liege, and captured Neuville-en-Condroz.

Patton's 3rd army forces, mean-

while, pressed their slow, slugging battle against strong German covering units holding the heights east of the Moselle, deepening and strengthening five bridgeheads across the river above and below Metz and just west of Nancy.

Headquarters spokesmen revealed for the first time that Patton's mechanized army was being supplied by air with gasoline and oil, to get his huge array of armor started again on the road to the Rhineland.
