## Steel Production Resumed At Gary

### Striking Cranemen Returning To Jobs

Gary, Ind., Nov. 22 (U.P.)—Steel production at the Gary works of the Carnegie-Illinois Steel company was resumed today after striking crane operators returned to work. The two-day wildcat strike which had tied up steel production at the world's largest steel plant for 24 hours, ended when the first two shifts of 13 crane men each reported to their jobs at midnight and 8 a. m. Grievance negotiations, which by contractual agreement could not be carried on while a strike was in progress, will be resumed later today.

Meanwhile, a spokesman said nine relief crane operators, whose lay-off last Sunday resulted in the walkout, had been put back to work on a temporary basis.

Company officials said the work stoppage caused a loss of 30,000 tons of basic steel and threw 3,500 workers off the job for two days.

The strike began Monday with the walkout of 13 men on the first shift and spread to 26 operators on other two shifts.

Representatives of the army, navy and U. S. conciliation service appealed to the men to return to work in conciliation meetings held yesterday.

Joseph Goin, sub-district director of United Steel Workers of America (CIO), said the strike was unauthorized. However, Goin charged that the company violated agreements providing for relief operators.

A company spokesman said the men struck when the company did not take action on their request for year-round relief operators. During the summer months the crane men are given 30 minute relief periods every two hours when the heat in the cabs reaches 90 degrees, every four hours when it is 85 degrees.

It was possible that some warships had sought refuge at Brunel bay after having been damaged in the second battle on the Philippines last month.

Other bombers from the south-

west Pacific command sank two coastal vessels, probably sank two freighters and damaged five other vessels in attacks in the Philippines, Borneo and Celebes.

Francis McCarthy, United Press war correspondent at the Leyte front, said the American 32nd division was expected to occupy Limon, strategic village guarding the northern entrance to the rolling Ormoc plain, "fairly soon" despite repeated enemy attempts to break the encirclement.

### Toll On Palau

Pearl Harbor, T. H., Nov. 22 (U.P.)—American ground forces killed or captured 66,655 Japanese in the Marianas and Palau islands during the past five months and scattered remnants of the enemy garrisons still are being hunted down and destroyed, a communique

disclosed today. Although all organized resistance on the islands ended long ago, American patrols still are meeting bitter-end resistance from isolated enemy soldiers, headquarters spokesmen said, disclosing that more than 2,000 Japanese were killed in the caves on Peleliu island in the past month.

The Japanese casualties for the five months included 63,388 dead and 3,267 captured.

Baltic fleet, stormed through a powerful chain of fortifications thrown across the two-mile neck of the peninsula yesterday. The harried towns of Rahuete and Kai-

mi, along with 17 other farm and fishing villages, were taken by the Soviets as they moved in for the kill.

Russian warships patrolled the shore of the island to prevent any German evacuation and poured a drumfire of shells into the ring of Nazi coastal batteries and armaments that for months had commanded the 17-mile-wide Irbentz strait linking the Baltic sea with the Gulf of Riga.

There was no new word on the progress of the fighting on the Latvian mainland opposite Saari where Russian forces were battling to wipe out the remnants of 30 German divisions pocketed on the 60-square-mile Courland peninsula.
