Berne Community Fund Organized

15 Berne Residents Contribute To Fund

Organization of a non-profit enterprise, to be known as the Berne Community Fund, has been announced. The foundation is being formed to create a charter and by-laws for a permanent incorporation trust, which will receive and accept such funds that individuals or corporations may want to make for community, charitable, welfare or educational projects.

Fifteen Berne men have already subscribed over \$2,500 towards the new organization. The proposed by-laws stipulate that representatives from the town council, Berne school board and Chamber of Commerce shall be members of this executive committee.

At a meeting of the subscribers to the foundation the following men were named members of the temporary executive committee: C. T. Hubert, president; E. J. Schaefer, vice-president; Clinton H. Springer, secretary; C. T. Michels, treasurer; and E. W. Baumgartner, Clarence H. Springer and M. L. Springer. This committee will also draw up articles for the permanent organization of the foundation.

In forming the new organization, attention has been called to the fact that at present there is no organization of a community nature that is incorporated to receive, handle or disburse funds for community or private benevolences and welfare. The Berne Community Fund would be in a sense comparable to the community fund organization now prevalent in many cities. This group is, however, not to be a community fund raising or organization, but rather a means for encouraging cooperative planning for Berne and surrounding territory.

Repeal Of Wagner Act Is Demanded

NLRB Assailed By Teamsters' Union

Chicago, Jan. 8.—(UP)—Repeal of the Wagner act and abolition of the National Labor Relations board, which it termed "nothing more than a standing committee of the CIO," were demanded today by the International teamsters union (IAFL).

An article, credited to Thomas E. Flynn, executive assistant to President Daniel J. Tobin, in the January issue of the International teamsters' magazine, charged the NLRB with joining with the CIO to take advantage of the teamsters' stand against wartime strikes and authorize "raids" by the rival union. "We will not sanction any strike by our members during the crucial period of this war no matter how great the provocation or how unjust the treatment we have received," the article stated. "The CIO knows that and the NLRB knows that and they both take advantage of it. The NLRB authorizes raids by the CIO after the WB has failed to reach a decision in our cases and our men have become exasperated and inflamed by the CIO agitators."

"Thus we are placed in an incongruous position of being penalized by two agencies of the Federal government because we are keeping our wartime pledge we made to the government."

"We have nothing to hope for from the NLRB," Flynn's article continued. "It is thoroughly biased and is working for the CIO rather than for labor as a whole."

"Therefore our only recourse appears to be to ask congress to repeal the Wagner Act and wipe out the NLRB, which has become nothing more than a standing committee of the CIO."

on June 30, 1946. Mr. Roosevelt will ask congress to raise the statutory debt limit, now \$260,000,000 (B).

He estimated that the public debt alone would cost \$4,500,000,000 in the fiscal year 1946. His calculation of war expenditures for the next fiscal year ranged from less than \$60,000,000 to more than \$82,000,000,000 depending on when or whether Germany is licked in the period covered. He arbitrarily proposed \$70,000,000,000 as a tentative estimate of war expenditures. Of this amount, \$39,000,000,000 would be spent by the army, \$22,000,000,000 by the navy, and the rest by other government agencies.

This budget would reduce overall 1946 expenditures by about \$17,822,000,000 from the \$101,502,000,000 being spent in the current fiscal year.

Mr. Roosevelt estimated net treasury revenue in the 1946 fiscal year at \$41,254,000,000 compared with the 1945 estimate of \$47,724,000,000. But he reported that we will be able in the next fiscal year to pay almost exactly half of all government and war costs from current income. A goal long sought. It will be necessary to borrow only about \$35,000,000,000 in public war loans. Federal trust funds will invest an additional \$5,000,000,000 in government securities, bringing loan proceeds approximately level with tax revenue.

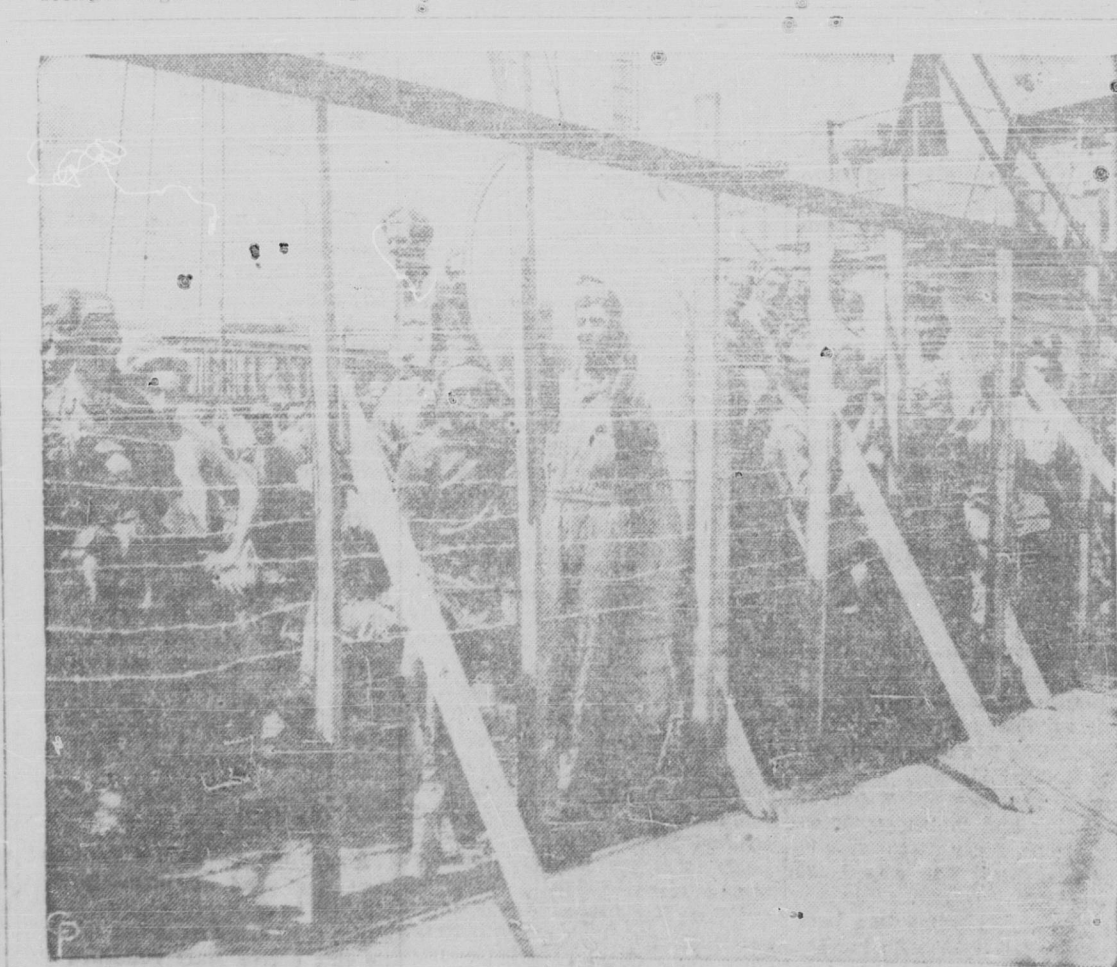

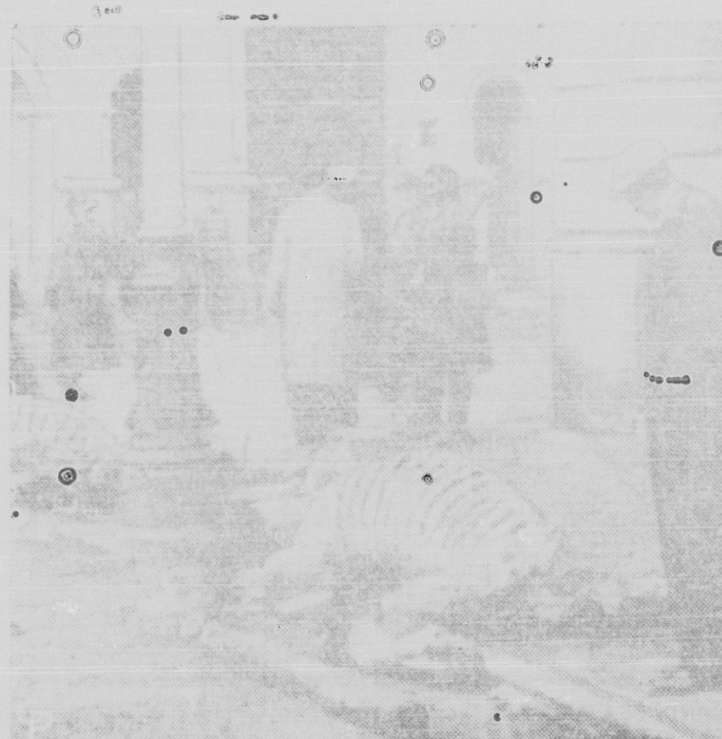

Planning Extension Of Powers Of WLB

F. D. R. Intimates Extension Planned

Washington, Jan. 8.—(UP)—President Roosevelt intimated strongly in his annual budget message to congress today that he plans to extend powers of the war labor board through the reconversion era and to mould a post war labor policy along the lines of wartime mediation practices.

"We must apply some of our wartime lessons in labor-management cooperation in working out a sound long-range labor policy implemented by permanent mediation machinery for the adjustment of labor disputes," he said.

The President is expected to request specific legislation after the W. L. B. submits a report on post war legislative authority which it regards as necessary to handle wage and other labor disputes during the reconversion era. Mr. Roosevelt also indicated that he may meet labor demands for wage adjustments to compensate for incomes reduced after the war. Anticipated reductions in war expenditures will result in lower incomes, he said, even if wage ceilings are adjusted upward to avoid reduction in average living rates when overtime is curtailed.
