cided to hear Pierre Laval at 1:30 p.m. tomorrow."

He overruled vigorous objections by defense counsel, Fernand Payen, chief of defense, protested that "Laval's appearance won't bring any light on Petain's affairs. Nothing will come of it. There will have to be time to get documents in advance to discover what Laval is going to say."

Prosecutor Andre Mornet said Payen's conclusions "seem to me to be premature." He himself had said earlier that he had no wish to summon Laval.

The decision was reached after the court had deliberated privately for an hour and a quarter. The announcement caused a sensation.

Payen sprang up, demanding an opportunity to study documents before Laval was called. The session was suspended again, and after 19 minutes further deliberation Mongeau announced he was overruling the objections and maintaining the decision.

Laval, a bedraggled figure on the first day after his return as a prisoner to Paris, was escorted from his cell of solitary confinement in Fresnes for the beginning of his preliminary investigation.

He wept when he appeared for formal sealing of the baggage he brought with him from Spain. His cell on the first floor was one normally reserved for ranking traitors and collaborationists, one nobody was allowed to approach save



Sen. Kenneth Wherry, R., Neb., charged that the army was "playing hell with manpower." He said the senate war investigating committee should make a survey of everything covered in Johnson's speech and "if that fails I would put the whole question squarely to the President."

Johnson was joined by Wherry and Sen. Burton K. Wheeler, D., Mont., in criticizing draft director Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey's statement that the army would continue to draft 100,000 men a month even after Japan's defeat.

Wheeler said Hershey's latest statement "shocked" him and charged that the army "has more men now than it knows what to do with." He insisted that it "ought to be releasing men just as fast as it can."

"They've got men in Europe who've got wives and young children here in the United States," Wheeler said. "They're anxious to get home. Their wives are anxious to have them. And their children need their father's guidance."
