

## Explosive Topics At VFW Convention

### Control Of Atomic Energy On Agenda

Chicago, Oct. 3—(UP)—Development of a new standard of living based on vast expansion of peacetime production is America's major post-war task, William Green, American Federation of Labor president, told veterans of foreign wars today.

Speaking before the 46th National VFW encampment, Green said that only with the creation and maintenance of full employment at high wages could private industry "save itself and the free enterprise system."

"Nothing could happen which would contribute more largely to the preservation of our free enterprise system than to develop a civilian economy which would create widespread opportunity for servicemen to find work and engage in business," he said.

America must have expansion of peacetime production, full employment and a greater measure of social security to develop the higher standard of living demanded by the post-war world, Green said.

Resolutions on control of atomic power, additional labor rights for veterans and compulsory military training are reported to have gone through committees and are expected to be adopted.

pected to provide explosive discussion when presented to the convention proper today.

Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, selective service director, was slated to address the veteran's group today.

High on the agenda for floor discussion were proposals for retaining the secret of the atomic bomb within the U. S., which were jolted yesterday when soldiers of the United Nations veterans' victory conference called for international control of such "new discoveries."

The veterans, representing 23 allied nations and meeting in connection with the VFW convention, urged that the united nations have "the means and wisdom to insure the proper use of these scientific discoveries," including radar and jet propulsion.

Ratification of the international group's resolution, virtually demanded by diplomatic propriety, would compromise the position of a large number of the state delegations and spark considerable floor debate.

A resolution expected to cause similar heated debate called for passage of legislation granting statutory seniority to veterans to enable them to qualify for jobs.

Such legislation already has been presented to congress by Rep. Harold Knutson (R), Minn., and met stubborn opposition by labor groups. Under the bill, veterans would be granted seniority equivalent to time in service.

The VFW, since 1919 a strong advocate of compulsory military training, may alter its position in view of suggestions that the atomic bomb would substitute for a large military peace-enforcement organization. The basic principle still is favored, but it was felt that a part-time program in connection with National Guard or R. O. T. C. service would be acceptable.

Amendments to the GI bill of rights, particularly its loan features, were subjects of several resolutions urging additional power of the lender to appraise the loan. Another amendment proposed would raise the educational benefits offered veterans.

## Truman Recommends Waterway Approval

### Urques St. Lawrence Agreement Approved

Washington, Oct. 3—(UP)—President Truman today recommended to congress speedy approval of an agreement between this country and Canada for the development of the long-discussed St. Lawrence river waterway and power project.

The President pointed out that Canada, expecting this country to join in completing the St. Lawrence project, already has built more than half of its share of the undertaking.

"We, however, still have our major contribution to make," the President said.

Resolutions of approval were introduced in congress yesterday by Rep. Adolph J. Sabath, D., Ill., and Senate Democratic Leader Alben W. Barkley of Kentucky.

Mr. Truman recommended that previous plans to turn over the power facilities of the project to New York state be followed after construction by the federal government.

"It has always been understood by the responsible proponents of this development that the water power project should become the property of the state of New York, and that the electric power should be developed and handled by the state," the President said in his message.

"That should continue to be the policy, and I recommend that it be so declared by the congress," he said.

Mr. Truman pointed out that when the United States-Canadian agreement of March 19, 1941, for the development of the Great Lakes-St. Lawrence basin is approved by congress, the two countries will be able to harness one of the greatest natural resources on this continent.

He explained that the project would result in "opening the Great Lakes to ocean navigation and creating 2,200,000 horsepower of hydroelectric capacity to be divided equally between the people of the United States and Canada."

## Scientific Tortures Of Nazis Revealed

### Cruelty Of Doctors Disclosed At Trial

Lueneburg, Oct. 3—(UP)—Evidence that Nazi physicians used women prisoners at the Belsen and Oswiecim concentration camps as human guinea pigs for sadistic sterilization experiments was introduced today at the atrocity trial of 4 German camp guards.

Chief prosecutor Col. T. M. Backhouse revealed that he had obtained 100 affidavits from survivors of the two Nazi camps describing in shocking detail the "scientific" tortures practiced by German doctors.

The prosecutor indicated that investigators were searching for still more witnesses and might introduce even more damning testimony against the 45 men and women defendants before he closed his case.

Backhouse read an affidavit prepared by a 31-year-old Frenchwoman named Renée Erman who said she was a nurse in the notorious "black tent" at the Oswiecim camp. She said Nazi doctors there used women prisoners for a wide

variety of sex experiments. In one instance, her affidavit charged, the doctors sterilized a group of Greek girls with strong x-rays that dried up their ovaries.

Miss Erman's testimony said some of the girls died under the treatment. Those who survived were subjected to another operation in which their sexual organs were removed. They died after the second experiment.

The witness said she saw the results of the surgery when she was called in to help dress the girls' wounds.

She cited another case in which a German doctor made an incision in a woman prisoner's womb, placed an electric plate in the wound and turned on the current to watch the results. The woman remained conscious throughout this torture.

Wabash Continues  
Rise At Lafayette

Indianapolis, Oct. 3—(UP)—Indianapolis weather bureau meteorologists said today that the Wabash river continued to rise at Lafayette where the reading was 17.7 feet, 4.7 feet over flood stage. The west fork of the White river was eight tenths of a foot over its 15-foot flood stage at Edwardsport, but the weather bureau said the stage was not critical. Streams all over Indiana are up after days of heavy rains.

## Present Payroll Tax Retention Is Urged

Indianapolis, Oct. 3—(UP)—The Indiana state chamber of commerce today urged its members to ask their congressmen for retention of the present one per cent payroll tax for the federal old age and survivors insurance fund.

The chamber issued a bulletin opposing the automatic increase in the payroll tax to two and one-half percent next Jan. 1. It said the old age and survivors trust fund balance was 25 times the present level of annual expenditures, and that an increase in the tax was unnecessary.
