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1939 after the end of the Polish campaign but bad weather and shortage of armaments delayed the attack.

"The question now arose whether or not we should carry the war into Britain by landing on a grand scale. Furthermore, in view of the possible eventuality of the U. S. A. entering the war it was necessary to take into consideration the occupation of a number of advanced support points in the Atlantic, in Iceland and the Azores."

Jodl said the attack on Britain and occupation of the Atlantic islands was rejected because the Germans lacked naval and air strength.

Jodl exhorted the Gauleiters to ferret out traitors and develop the will to resist. He told them that the necessity for war had been clear to everyone when Germany

entered hostilities. It wasn't till the situation had become acute, he said, that the German people began to ask whether they had not undertaken too much.

Alderman asserted that Jodl's speech identified him completely with the Nazi conspirators.

The prosecution introduced a memorandum written by Hjalmar Schacht to Hitler in 1935 revealing that Germany had spent \$44,000,000 on secret armaments that year.

It also showed that Germany had built up a deficit of \$210,000,000 between 1928 and 1935. This debt, largely due to rearmament, was being financed by using the money market for short term credits.

"All Germany's resources must be concentrated to finance armaments," Schacht said. He urged reduction of all other expenditures. Medical experts have decided a baby 10 months old.

Hess is temporarily insane, and the tribunal is expected to hand down a ruling Friday dismissing him from trial until he is cured, reliable informants said.

French, Russian and American medical reports show "complete accord" about Hess. It was understood, while the British disagree slightly on minor points.

The tribunal is expected to order Hess to submit to a narcotic treatment used in neuropsychiatric cases, combined with shock treatment. Experts believe his nervous amnesia condition can be cured in 15 to 30 days.

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Washington state highway police said. Had the schoolbus been completed its circuit, it would have been carrying up to 50. Loss of life was lowered because many parents were driving their children to schools through the snowstorm.

The victims were students in the high school, junior high school and grade schools of nearby Chelan, Wash.

Heroine of the accident was Mrs. Glenna Brown, 37-year-old farm wife, who boarded the bus to keep a dentist appointment in Chelan. She saved several of the children by pushing them through broken windows as the bus rolled over in the lake and sank after floating momentarily.

"I can still hear the helpless cries and screaming of those children," Mrs. Brown said as she lay prostrate from her experience.

Donnie Mack, 13, said that he "nearly fainted" when the bus catapulted down the 15-foot cliff into the water.

"But the cold water brought me to and I headed for the first broken window," he said. "I got out before the water started coming in. Fast, but when I saw my pal, Ronnie, down, I wished I was back in there. He can't swim you know, and he headed out into the lake instead of into shore."

Donnie cried.

Divers, operating from a lake barge floated over the spot where the big bus disappeared, thought once that they had located the sunken vehicle at the 65-foot level. But pain and broken glass on a ledge at the 144-foot level led them to believe the bus had dropped even deeper.

The diet will meet for 18 days, then be dissolved to make way for the new house of representatives soon to be elected, probably in January.

The proposed election reforms would give voting rights to all persons above 20 years, regardless of sex. Men or women could become candidates for office at 25. This law would, based on the 1944 census, mean an electorate of 42,910,500. Eligible voters in the 1937 election totaled 14,479,554.

To ensure free voting, the government already has announced its policy of refraining from interfering in the coming general election. It is expected to ask the diet for wholesale reform of past electioneering control regulations.
