Health Suggestion:

The Indiana State Medical Association has sent out New Year greetings which include the following ten rules for keeping well and fit through 1946:

Eat three good meals a day, containing the vitamins and minerals you need.

Get enough rest every night. That does not mean eight hours of sleep, but enough to make you feel rested. Some people require more, some less. But get your requirement every night, for you can't catch up on lost sleep.

Get some exercise every day. It may be only walking—but see that you use those muscles that will become flabby if you sit at a desk all day.

Get some relaxation, some change from your hum drum duties. Maybe a game of chess is your dish, maybe you like something more strenuous like bowling or handball. But change the scenery a little—forget your cares for a while. It will take the wrinkles out of your brow.

Take it easy. The helter skelter rush of modern life does much to undermine health.

Observe the rules of safety—in your home, in driving your car, in crossing streets. Be careful and there will not be so much likelihood of long convalescence to mend your broken bones.

Be moderate—in eating, in drinking, in driving, in everything.

Avoid self-medication. If you have any persistent disorders, see your doctor. Do not rely on barbiturates to get you to sleep. Too many people have taken an overdose in recent years.

Cultivate a good mental attitude toward life and health. If you are always looking for symptoms, you will surely find them.

Remember that your doctor can do much more to prevent disease than to cure it, so have a physical check-up at least once a year, often if you see any signs of trouble.

Lt. Stalter's Collection Of War Souvenirs Includes Many Of Gen. Wolff's Belongings



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One of the largest collections of war souvenirs and curios (Picture above) in the county is located at the Dorus Stalter apartment, 148½ S. South Second street and belonging to First Lt. Robert A. Stalter, a military police officer attached to the 88th Division in Italy. Lt. Stalter was one of the American officers who arrested Gen. Karl Wolff, commander of all German S. S. troops, in Bolzano, Italy, last May 7, when Hitler's empire crumbled under the might of U. S. armies.

Several personal belongings of Gen. Wolff were obtained by Lt. Stalter when the German commander and his staff were forced to vacate general headquarters in the Italian city. Included are two coats, an officer's jacket and hat, boots, a Browning automatic shotgun and a box of personal calling

cards. The coats are shown hanging on the wall to the right, with the gun alongside. A pearl handled revolver which had been inscribed with Heinrich Himmler's name and crest was also obtained from the pocket of Wolff's coat, but later was commandeered by an American general.

The collection is open to friends who call at the Stalter apartment, three sides of the room being covered with German and Italian flags, clothing and other articles obtained by Lt. Stalter.

The boots to the left are SS

troops and those to the right are Italian leather boots. The center flag, above, is an Italian king's banner. The German flag on the left is 14 by 10 feet in size. The two vase type lamps are hand carved of Italian stone, purchased by Lt. Stalter.

Besides the articles and objects just listed above, the collection includes a German Luger gun, a P-38 revolver and 26 pieces of Italian wood carving.

The center strip below the North African tapestry, is an array of German medals which, in his hurry to get away, General Wolff forgot to award to his soldiers. Below is an exhibit of German, Italian and French helmets, several of which were worn by Lt. Stalter.

Lt. Stalter went overseas in December, 1942, and served in North Africa and Italy. Now, he is stationed in Germany with the army of occupation.
