## Fear Expressed At Mine Workers Meet

Atlantic City, N. J., Oct. 2.—(UP)—Pronouncements of the United Mine Workers (AFL) reflected alarm today over the threat of legislative curbs on labor.

UMW leaders at the union's biennial convention appeared as concerned with combating that threat as they were with carrying on their fight against wage and price controls.

Fear of labor legislation was voiced yesterday in the opening speech of vice president John O'Leary, presiding in the absence of president John L. Lewis, who was ill in Washington. The same fear was expressed in the officers' report signed by Lewis, O'Leary and secretary Thomas J. Kennedy. AFL president William Green dwelt on the same issue late yesterday when he appeared before the convention for the first time since the split over the CIO 10 years ago.

The officers' report singled out 12 senators and congressmen who were described as leaders of a coalition hostile to labor. They were Sen. Joseph H. Ball, R., Minn.; Robert A. Taft, R., Ohio; Kenneth S. Wherry, R., Neb.; Harry F. Byrd, D., Va.; Carl Hatch, D., N. M.; and Allen Ellender, D., La.; and Reps. Howard Smith, D., Va.; E. E. Cox, D., Ga.; Andrew J. May, D., Ky.; Charles A. Halleck, R., Ind.; Leslie Arendall, R., Ill.; and Clarence J. Brown, R., O.
