Water Drinking with Meals for Indigestion

MOST people who suffer from constipation would be amazed if told they could find their best remedy in a glass of water. And yet, to a great extent, it's true. A single glass of water, naturally, will do no good. But the regular and consistent drinking of water with meals will. No fewer than two glasses of water should be taken at each meal and these must be consumed in addition to other fluids, such as milk tea, or coffee.

Digestive Process
Water plays an enormous role in the digestion of food. It is essential from the first to the last step in the digestive process.

In the very beginning, water, together with digestive juices, is drawn into the stomach and mixed with the food. This process is repeated again and again in the bowel, until all digestible food is prepared for absorption. Then the water, with the food it contains, is re-absorbed, through the wall of the intestine, leaving indigestible food parts in a somewhat dry mass within the bowel. Since water is so necessary to the digestive process, the best time to take it is with meals.

This is shown by a series of studies carried out by Dr. James A. McKenney of Oakland, California, to determine the relationship of water to constipation. He kept records to show whether

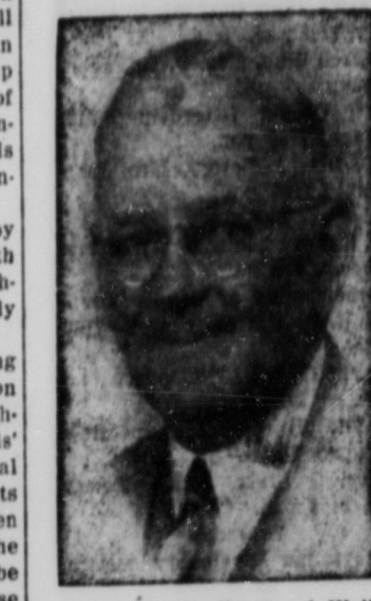

Dear Voters:

Last Spring I promised to give you a detailed plan of my program before the general election November 5. I am doing this in public print rather than by answering innumerable questionnaires, because I believe all of the people should know all of the promises made by a legislative candidate.

Some of the issues are obvious, but as Adams County's only candidate for any legislative office, I believe they should be pointed out for your inspection and information. They are:

ROADS & STREETS:

Either greater distribution from the gasoline tax fund or higher property tax levies must be made to replace our county roads and city streets in the condition they were in 1935. I favor greater gasoline tax refunds.

CONSERVATION:

Among immediate necessities of this department are: transferring from state general fund of money lost by the fish and game division by issuance of free licenses; a real merit system for conservation department employees and an enlargement of the state park system.

EDUCATION:

Because the state public school system is now ranked below the national average an immediate improvement is necessary. This must include a revision of teachers' salaries.

PUBLIC BUILDING:

I favor junking of 90% of the proposed 40-million dollar improvement program for the next two years because of high costs and the necessity of men and materials in Veteran's housing at the state Universities and colleges.

ELECTIONS:

The whole election law must be revised to prevent such 'legal' frauds as occurred in Marion county and other localities in 1944. I always have favored a statewide primary for U. S. Senate and state candidates.

BUSINESS:

I will oppose the proposed 30 million dollar annual general sales tax on the grounds that it

LABOR:

A revision of all labor legislation is needed. No major changes have been made since 1935 in spite of the great differences in economic conditions.

AGRICULTURE:

I propose eliminating the state's right to mandate local governments to raise costs because in the last ten years, real estate and personal property taxes have risen to the 1933 high level. We now have the same high property taxes which ruined farmers after 1929 plus the gross income tax. I propose planning at Purdue university which would bring the agricultural side of the campus up to the level enjoyed by the engineering departments. I would approve public help by townships to farmers' institutes, if a majority or more of the taxpayers wanted them.

Please accept my appreciation for the honors you have paid me in the past. Meeting many of you has been a great pleasure. Because you saw fit to re-elect me in the past, I have had the honor of serving as my party's floor leader, as a member of the budget and ways and means committees as well as on the agriculture, labor, education, county and township affairs and other committees. If my experience will be helpful to you I will be glad to serve you for another 61 day session to the best of my ability.
