**'God Of Creation'****Here Thursday Night****Ministers Sponsor  
Film Showing Here**

Vivid full-color scenes from astronomy and natural science are featured in the "The God of Creation" sound motion picture to be shown at 8 o'clock, Thursday evening at the Zion Evangelical and Reformed church, Jackson and Third streets, under the sponsorship of the Decatur Industrial association.

Produced in Moody Institute of Science, west coast department of Moody Bible Institute, by Irwin A. Moon, Sc. D., "The God of Creation" is the second in a series of evangelistic films. The first film by Dr. Moon, "They Live Forever," had a large showing in all parts of the country.

In the opening section of "The God of Creation" the audience takes a trip to the stars by means of solar photographs taken through the giant 100-inch telescope of Mt. Wilson observatory in southern California, and views complex gyrations of the solar system.

Lapse-time photography is utilized to demonstrate the beauties of natural science. The illusion of flower buds developing into full-blown blossoms in a few seconds is created through this time-compressing photo technique. The metamorphosis of a caterpillar through the various stages from worm to butterfly, and pollination of flowers are seen on the screen in full color.

Believed to be the first of their kind are the natural-color pictures of photosynthesis, the mysterious food-manufacturing process resulting from the action of sunlight on green leaves.

Through photomicrography the audience peers into the microscopic world of a drop of water and observes the complexity of tiny organisms, enlarged more than a million times.

**Beaumont Heavily  
Damaged By Flood****Surrounding Area  
Rice Crop Ruined**

Beaumont, Tex., Nov. 5.—(UP)—Flood waters which swirled through half of Beaumont and destroyed the surrounding area's rich rice crop received today, but authorities warned that more rain would "ruin" this city of 100,000.

Damage already was estimated at \$4,000,000 (M) from yesterday's flash flood, and weather forecasters said there was a possibility of continued rain. Farmers said destruction of the unharvested rice crop would add "millions of dollars" to the loss.

Hundreds of persons were forced from their homes in the west end residential district when the angry Neches river overflowed its banks. Basements of both homes and business buildings were filled with water. The sheriff's office, however, said no serious injuries or loss of life had been reported.

Residents were given enough warning to reach higher ground. They were aided by outboard motorboats cruising the flooded streets. Hundreds returned to their flooded homes last night, but were forced to occupy only the upper floors and spent a wakeful night in anticipation of more rain.

The flash flood swept through Beaumont yesterday with heavy damage to homes after a sustained rainfall which measured 7.71 inches during the 12 hours from Sunday night to Monday morning.

Damage to business establishments was caused when the downtown drainage system was jammed and basements of stores and office buildings were flooded.

**Some Pacific Isles  
To UN Trusteeship****U. S. Seeks To Hold  
Bases Termned Vital**

Washington, Nov. 5.—(UP)—President Truman is expected soon to offer to place Pacific Islands captured from Japan under United Nations trusteeship, but with the proviso that the United States be made sole trustee of bases vital to her security, a reliable diplomatic source said today.

Such a decision would mean that Mr. Truman finally had decided in favor of the state department in what has been a long and bitter interdepartmental fight.

The state department contends that UN trusteeship, with the United States as sole trustee, would

give this country ample authority to develop bases needed for its security in the Pacific.

The navy, supported by the army, has fought the state department position vigorously. The navy fears that Russia, as a member of the security council, would be able to veto proposals to fortify Pacific bases.

The navy is known to want full control of Tinian, Iwo Jima, Saipan and Okinawa.

As far back as last January, Mr. Truman said the United States would ask the United Nations for exclusive trusteeship over vital Pacific islands.

He restated this position Sunday

at Independence, Mo., making it known through White House press secretary Charles G. Ross that the United States intended to keep exclusive control for a long time of the bases deemed essential to her security.

If the president acts in accordance with his reported decision, islands not deemed essential probably would be entrusted to collective trusteeship.

State department officials point out that the UN charter provides for establishment of trusteeships on the basis of agreements submitted by the nations offering dependent areas as trusts.

They added that this country ob-

viously would not submit any agreement curtailing U. S. power to make full defensive use of advanced Pacific bases.

Compensation Claims  
By Vets Declining

Indianapolis, Nov. 5.—(UP)—Weekly unemployment compensation claims by veterans of World War II are declining, director Noble R. Shaw of the Indiana employment security division said today.

Shaw, making his monthly report, said the number of veterans claiming their weekly allowances drop-

ped from more than 21,000 in the week ending Oct. 5 to about 17,000 per week at the end of that month. He said that more than 126,000 checks were issued in Indiana during October under state and federal unemployment benefit programs. These amounted to \$61,872, he said, of which \$513,717 was paid out to veterans.
