Greenfield Man Is Conservation Head

Succeeds Matter In Patronage Squabble

Indianapolis, Nov. 27 — (UP) — John Nigh of Greenfield today headed the Indiana state department of conservation, succeeding Milton Matter, who resigned after a long patronage controversy with Governor Gates and the Republican state committee.

The governor announced the appointment of Nigh as director and Byron C. Kennedy of Wabash, now assistant deputy attorney general, as assistant director and counsel for the department. Gates revealed his choice for the post late yesterday after conferences with conservation department officials and Republican leaders.

Nigh, 54, served under Matter as chief of conservation and law enforcement officers. Once owner of the Greenfield dry goods store, he served as Hancock county sheriff from 1929-30. He is Hancock county Republican chairman and 10th district GOP chairman.

Kennedy, 39, a Wabash county judge until he entered the navy during the war, served in the U. S. navy intelligence corps. He was prosecuting attorney in Wabash county in 1930, elected judge in 1934 and re-elected in 1940. He was appointed deputy attorney general by James A. Emmert, attorney general.

Emmert Working On Anti-Klan Measure

Attorney General Drafting New Bill

Indianapolis, Nov. 27—(UP)—Atty. Gen. James A. Emmert today went to work on a bill which would in effect outlaw the Ku Klux Klan and Columbians, Inc., in Indiana.

At a meeting of the Republican legislative policy committee yesterday Emmert was instructed to draft a proposed law for Indiana, constructed on the lines of a New York statute which has been in effect since 1923.

The New York law makes a matter of public record the intricate machinery of all organizations requiring secret oaths as a condition of membership.

The statute, amended in New York in 1923, weathered a test before the United States supreme court five years later.

"It's a tried and tested law for keeping activities of race-and-religious-hating organizations at a minimum," a spokesman for the GOP policy committee said.

"There's no reason why Indiana shouldn't have one built on the same principles."

Exempted from the rule were labor unions, benevolent orders and college fraternities and sororities.

Newsprint Scarcity Perils Newspapers

Washington, Nov. 27—(UP)—Complaints from publishers indicate the biggest threat to the existence of small newspapers is the scarcity of newsprint at any price, a source close to the senate small business committee said today.

Prompted by these and other complaints, the committee has sent questionnaires to 10,000 dailies and weeklies asking them to list what factors "imperil their existence as a profitable business in a competitive field."

Fort Wayne Industry Employment Declines

Fort Wayne, Ind., Nov. 27—(UP)—The Business Digest, monthly review of the chamber of commerce, today reported a decline in industrial employment here during October.

During the last month 65 firms reported a total employment of 33,898 against 34,548 in September. Even with the decline the month's figure was more than the 28,337 reported in October, 1945.
