## Municipal League Seeks Legislation

### Key Objectives Of League Are Listed

Indianapolis, January 7 — The Indiana municipal league today opened its drive for legislation to save Hoosier cities and towns from impending financial disaster or its alternative — back-breaking property taxes.

In a memorandum to mayors and other city officials, Mayor W. Vincent Youke of Crown Point, the executive secretary of the League, warned that campaigning for the league's legislative program must start immediately.

Key objectives of the league in the 1947 session of the Legislature, involving the distribution of \$20,000,000 in state-collected funds, are:

1. Repeal of the gross income tax on municipal revenues.
2. Return to the cities and towns of \$8,000,000 of the state's annual gross income tax collection of \$45,958,895.
3. Return to the cities and towns of \$7,000,000 of the state's annual \$17,061,518 excise tax collections, because of the responsibilities and additional duties falling upon the local units in the enforcing of the liquor law and control of its attendant problems—drunks, brawls, reckless driving, gambling, sales to minors, crowded court dockets, etc., all of which demands greater police protection.
4. Return to the cities and towns of \$5,000,000 of the state's annual motor vehicles fund of \$42,751,614, to build and maintain the cities' heavily traveled streets.

The \$20,000,000 redistribution to cities and towns is in addition to the \$4,500,000 now received by municipalities and the grant of \$900,000 to larger cities from motor vehicle fund allocations to counties.

"The biggest part of this money comes from the cities and towns, and we are only asking for enough of it back to keep from sinking," Mayor Youke said. "This \$20,000,000 request is based on a 50 percent increase in the cost of municipal government — an increase which alone cannot bear."

Notwithstanding increases in salaries and wages, materials and maintenance, cities are faced with widespread obsolescence in equipment. This now has to be replaced as quickly as possible, Mayor Youke said.

of an emergency law permitting women to work at night.

Both CIO and AFL will unite in opposition to local option or any other form of liquor prohibition legislation.

A CIO official indicated that if pressure for a local option law appeared heavy, an attempt would be made to force legislation denying dry areas in Indiana financial benefits from the state liquor tax.

This, it was felt, would kill any battle for local option as communities "would be more interested in obtaining state funds than in going dry."

The CIO also planned to ask for a re-evaluation of the property tax system in Indiana. One official of the union said the present system contained numerous injustices. He indicated that the tax should be based not only on the value of the land and building but also on income derived from the property.
