Dying Miners Wrote

Notes To Families

Some Miners Lived Over Half A Day

Centralia, Ill., March 31.—(UP)—Without hysterics or heroics, 15 of the Centralia coal mine's 111 victims waited more than half a day to be rescued from the 540 foot gas-blasted pit, and then scribbled farewell notes to their wives and families, it was revealed today.

The notes were found in the pockets of the men who lay down to die in an underground room approximately a mile from the center of last Tuesday's explosion.

The last of the notes — timed off at 6:30 a.m. Wednesday — said: "It is sleeping in on us."

The writer referred to the deadly blanket of monoxide gas which spread through the tunnel after the 3:30 p.m. blast.

Written on scraps of paper which had served as sandwich wrappers and on small sheets torn from a pocket note book, the brief messages were mostly instuctions for clearing up personal affairs, declarations of love, and a plea from one miner that his wife make sure that their children attended church regularly.

The 15 men apparently had made no effort to brattice the doors of the worked-out coal room in which they were found. What ventilation remained in the mine after the explosion carried the fumes down the tunnel, past their "door," and then, almost 15 hours later, began seeping into every nook and cranny of the mine.

Rescuers found the men lying in the room as if they had merely stopped for a rest before proceeding to the shaft and safety. One miner had rolled his coat into a pillow and curled up on the hard floor.

A large note, lying on the floor, told rescuers there were "notes in our pockets." "Give to our wives."

After a brief scanning, the messages were returned to the men's pockets and their bodies brought to the surface. The notes were turned over to the families when they appeared to identify the bodies as they lay in the temporary morgue, awaiting burial today, to-


