Four Men Killed As Two Planes Collide

Mid-Air Collision Fatal To Four Men

Watertown, S. D., March 31.—(UP)—Two men were catapulted from their plane and plunged 500 feet to their death and two others were fatally burned Sunday when two small planes collided in mid-air.

Victims of the freak crash were identified as Dietrich Aschwege, 39, Corona, S. D.; William Fox, 29, Watertown; John Jennings, 31, Revillo, S. D.; and Harland Johnson, 24, Hartford, S. D.
Jerome Laguna, 10, the only witness to the crash, said the planes were about 500 feet in the air when they collided. He said they had been aloft about 15 minutes at the time.

Jennings and Johnson were thrown from their plane and fell to their death. The occupants of the other plane were burned to death.

The planes fell in a plowed field a short distance from each other. Both were demolished.

Authorities said Fox and Johnson, owners of the planes, were giving flying lessons to the other two when the crash occurred. They were unable to learn whether the instructors or the students were piloting the planes when they collided. They said neither Aschwege nor Jennings had many hours flying time.

'Red' Tickets Are Issued By Police

Approximately two dozen "red" tickets, costing the parking violator \$1 each in city "cafeteria" court, were issued by city police last Saturday. The tickets were issued for parking violations.

High Wheat Prices Laid To Government

Grain Exchange In Demands For Probe

Chicago, March 31.—(UP)—Grain exchange representatives today demanded a congressional investigation, charging that government officials "seek to mislead the public" with statements that speculation has caused high wheat prices.

The demand was made by the National Association of Commodity Exchanges and Allied Trades, Inc., in a letter to Sen. John J. Williams, R., Del. The organization charged that government grain purchases for export have boosted grain prices to the highest levels in 17 years.

The letter, written by the organization's executive vice president, J. A. Higgins, Jr., said in part: "We believe that it is . . . essential that federal officials be called upon to explain why they seek to mislead the public in belief that speculation rather than 'government scraping of the bin' is responsible for current high prices and the extent to which our country is leading support to proposals for world regimentation of agriculture."

"Certainly there is some reason for the too frequent attempts to discredit the commodity trades in the eyes of the public . . ."

The letter charged that the government "may have entered upon an overly ambitious" buying program.

The Commodity Exchange Association said that high prices were "the premium the American consumer must pay for our foreign economic operations."

"Federal officials should not attempt to discredit the commodity trades by the questionable tactics of sidestepping direct responsibility for the present high prices," it said.

"It charged that 'conflicting statements' and 'shifting programs' by government officials had unbalanced the grain market. The letter to Williams said that government purchases would cut the nation's wheat reserve to about 100,000,000 bushels, compared with a normal carry-over of 235,000,000 bushels."
