eral, told the senate committee that "a shooting war" with Russia is not inevitable. But, he said, the Soviets already have "great success" by exploiting "fear and hunger."

"There is a phase of war now in progress now," he said, "being waged by Russia—but not the Red army; it is being waged by the Communist party of Russia and its fifth columns throughout the world."

At 6 o'clock the eggs arrive at the modern refrigerated egg rooms in A&P's Toledo warehouse. Before daylight every one of them is on its way by fast insulated truck to the A&P stores. Not one egg remains at the warehouse.

Each has been candled, Graded A by government inspectors and dated.

They are kept under refrigeration at all times in the store, except for a few at the rush hours which are placed in handy displays for your convenience.

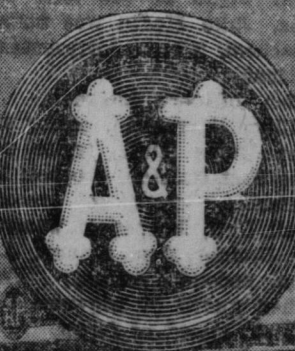
