able from the existing school tax levies without increasing the tax levies for these extra factors.

The intentions of consolidation will be advertised and become effective August 1 unless 50 or more legal voters of either or both units petition against the merger.

If such should be the case, a special election will be held to determine the matter.

The resolution now being prepared and adopted by the school boards provides that the Berne - French township school would be managed by a board of five members. Two of these members are to be appointed by the Berne town council, while the township trustee of French town-ship and a French township rep-resentative, named by that township advisory board, would provide the other members. These four mem-bers then would name the fifth alternating between the two sch-ool units.
