center next struck communities in the Clarksville, W. Va., area, killing three persons and leaving many injured. The town of West Milford, southwest of Clarksville, was hardest hit.

West Virginia state police said debris-strewn highways and driving rains hampered relief work.

Telephone service between Clarkburg and points south was cut off.

A woman and a man were killed last night when a twister struck near Alpha, Ky. The woman, Mrs. Bill Denny, was killed when the storm blew her house 50 feet off its foundations. Her husband and 15-year-old son were injured seriously. A man named Gregory, was killed when the wind destroyed his home and blew him 160 feet through the air.

A church in Alpha was demolished. Only the organ was left standing, but no deaths resulted. Deaths in

isolated regions were rumored but not confirmed.

Early this morning the storm center was moving eastward across Pennsylvania.

HITS INDIANA

Indianapolis, May 3—(UPI)—Residents of three eastern Indiana counties today were recovering from a tornado which demolished more than a dozen homes in the area yesterday and injured four persons.

The storm, accompanied by heavy rain, tore a 30-mile swath through Delaware, Randolph and Jay counties. Authorities said damage would run into thousands of dollars.

Three persons were injured when their home collapsed south of Portland. The victims were Mrs. Clarence Bickel, 53; Mrs. Mable Shawer, and her seven-year-old daughter, Sandra Kay, who was with 75 persons inside. Mrs. Henry Dailey, of near Ridgeville, was in the hospital with a

broken arm after her home collapsed.

State police said the storm formed three miles north of Muncie and struck first at DeSoto, in Delaware county. Then it hit near Ridgeville and dipped into Jay county before moving toward the Ohio state line, they said. They said damage was heaviest at Ridgeville.


