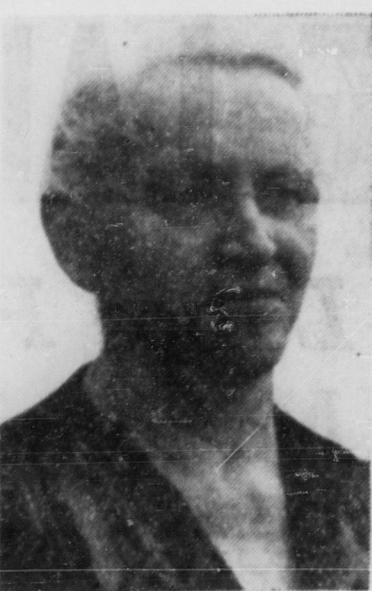

from two other Evansville men in the 8th district.

Unopposed for renomination were Rep. Gerald W. Landis, R., 7th district, who is slated to become chairman of the important house labor committee next year if Republicans stay in the majority in congress; Rep. Forest A. Harless, R., 5th district, and Rep. Noble J. Johnson, R., 6th district. The last time an incumbent congressman lost in his bid for reelection was six years ago. In 1942, Madden unseated William T. Schulte of Hammond in the spring primary and Charles M. La Follette, R., beat John W. Boehne, D., Evansville, in the eighth district election that fall.

In 1944, all of the 11 Indiana congressmen tried for two more years in office and all of them were successful in both the primary and general election.

In 1946, 10 of the congressmen elected in 1942 and re-elected in 1944 were up for re-election again, and all of them won both tests. The sole exception was La Follette, who dropped out of the congressional race to try for the senate.

Indiana also picks 250 nominees

for the state general assembly today. All legislative seats are up for re-election this year except 25 seats in the senate, where hold-over senators elected two years ago have two years more to serve.

Shelbyville Blast Fatal To One Man

Farm Bureau Plant Scene Of Explosion

Shelbyville, Ind., May 4—(UP)—The charred body of the manager of the Indiana Farm Bureau bulk gas plant here was dug from the wreckage of the plant today, 10 hours after a gasoline explosion set off a spectacular fire last night.

James Ross of Middletown, police said, was helping unload gasoline drums from a truck when the explosion occurred. Firemen from Shelbyville and other cities as far away as Indianapolis battled the resulting flames for five hours before the wreckage could be probed for Ross' body.

The search was temporarily abandoned shortly before dawn and then resumed after daylight. An Indianapolis truck driver was in a Shelbyville hospital for treatment of what physicians called "critical burns" and other injuries.

Police said Ross, of Middletown, was helping Marvin Rhoades, 28, the truck driver, unload drums of gasoline from a truck. They theorized that the gasoline leaked out and was ignited by friction.

The explosion sent 50,000 gallons of gasoline roaring into flames 250 feet high. Police said some 8,000 spectators flocked to the scene, hampering the arrival of fire-fighting equipment from nearby towns and from Indianapolis. The blaze could be seen as far away as 10 miles, they said.

At the hospital, doctors said Rhoades was badly burned and that several splinters had been driven into his body by the explosion.

An 8,000-gallons railroad tank car was kept from going up in flames when firemen played streams of water on it for several hours.

The blaze was extinguished about 2:30 a. m., ending danger to a factory and several homes in the area.

Farm bureau officials tentatively estimated the damage at about \$60,000.

543 Services Are Rendered In Month

Financial assistance given to veterans, their dependents and to civilians by the Red Cross during April, totaled \$420.75, the monthly report prepared by Mrs. Ruth Hollingsworth, executive secretary, shows.

To veterans and their dependents, the Red Cross expended \$262.75. Under the head of aid to civilians and for disaster relief, the Red Cross disbursed \$168.

Reports for military and veterans administration 7, emergency communications 7, assistance with claims for compensation and family allowance 3, assistance with claims for other government benefits 2, consultation and guidance 12, referral to other agencies 1, information 36, financial assistance 14, application for hospitalization 2, wheel chairs loaned out 2, war dead application 1, messages 7, home nursing book furnished 8, interviews 44, letters received 108, letters written 109, telephone calls in 83, telephone calls out 85, trips (80 mi.) 2, affidavits 4, notarizations 5, certification 1, a total of 543 services.

sents them, and not one representing the communist line."

Closing, Knox wrote, "our Evansville employees have just received the same wage increases we have already put into effect elsewhere, but now we want them to know and we herewith advise your (Sentner) that the Bucyrus-Erie Co. is not in any way interested or willing to enter into an agreement with the UECIO or any other union that is led, dominated or influenced by communists."

The wage increase mentioned in the letter became effective here April 26. It provided a nine percent raise for "non-incentive" workers and five percent for "incentive" workers. Copies of the letter were sent to all 1,200 employees.

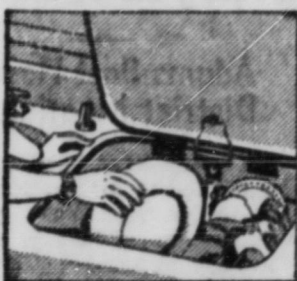
