Einaudi Slated For President Of Italy

Financial Expert Is New Favorite

Rome, May 11—(UP)—Senator
Luigi Einaudi, a financial expert,
today appeared assured of elec-
tion as president of Italy when all
parties agreed to back him on the
fourth and final ballot.

The Italian parliament met to
vote a third but indecisive ballot
today.

It gave Einaudi 462. Fifteen ab-
stained; 333 ballots were blank;
and the remainder were scattered
among unimportant candidates.
Shortly after a joint session of
the senate and chamber of de-
puties convened, 140 Communists,
Left Wing Socialists, Independ-
ents and splinter groups walked
out, making it impossible to reach
the necessary two-thirds majority
(600 votes) needed to elect on the
third ballot.

Right Wing Socialists and Re-
publicans cast only blank ballots
in the third round. They explained
the maneuver was designed to
display leftist independence of
the Catholic party and Premier
Aldice De Gasperi.

The communist senators and
deputies rebelled when they were
voted down in their attempt to
have the third ballot delayed for
consideration of the withdrawal of
the early favorite, Foreign Min-
ister Count Carlo Sforza, who
withdrew last night.

The Christian Democrats pick-
ed Einaudi as their new candi-
date replacing Sforza at a special
meeting this morning. They
adopted a resolution admitting
the foreign minister's candidacy
was hopeless in the face of stub-
born opposition. His withdrawal
was interpreted as a defeat for
the government and a revelation

Boy Shoots Father For Beating Mother

Edinburg, Ind., May 11—(UP)—
Roger Ellis Hasch, 13, was under
technical arrest today for shoot-
ing his father through the head
with a rifle.

The father, James Hasch, was re-
covering in Robert Long hospital
at Indianapolis.

Police chief Frank Andrews said
the shooting occurred when the
boy saw his father beating and
choking his wife, Dora, 34, on the
floor of the family home.

Young Truck Driver Killed In Accident

Brookville, Ind., May 11 — (UP)
— A 22-year-old truck driver from
Hagerstown was killed near here
yesterday when his truck went out
of control. James C. Fields, a driver
for Waller Motors, Inc., Rich-
mond, died of a broken neck and a
fractured skull.
