Below Phenomenal
Crop Of Last YearWashington, May 11 — (UP)—
It may not look like it out in
Kansas, but the nation this year
can expect its third largest wheat
crop in history.That's the gist of the agriculture
department's latest crop forecast.The department estimated winter
wheat production at \$45,000,000
bushels. It added that average
yields on the expected spring
acreage would boost total wheat
production to 1,117,000,000 bushels.But in Kansas, the nation's
leading wheat producer, the de-
partment estimated winter crop
production would fall from last
year's 287,000,000 bushels to 148,-
000,000 bushels this year. That's
a drop of 49 percent.The winter crop, as a whole,
