National Guard Is Above Fixed Quota

Keep On Enlisting Until Bill Signed

Washington, June 23—(UP)—The national guard said today that the surge of enlistments from draft age youths seeking to avoid conscription has boosted the guard's manpower above the 341,000 quota.

But the guard will keep on taking men, officials said, until President Truman signs the draft bill. They said they expect to sign up enough new recruits by the end of the week to raise their ranks to 375,000 men.

The quota limit is determined by congressional appropriation. But officials said they would keep on recruiting and ask congress for a deficiency appropriation when it reconvenes.

Until Mr. Truman signs the new 19-through-25 draft bill into law, youths who join the national guard or other active reserves will be exempt from the 21 month active service in the regular armed forces.

But they must sign up before the bill is signed. Mr. Truman has 10 days in which to act from the time he receives the measure. That may be later today.

When the enlistment boom started in the wake of congressional passage of the draft bill, the national guard had 250,000 men and a 1948 quota ceiling of 271,000. It had planned a ceiling of 341,000 by the end of fiscal 1949, and a top ceiling of 682,000 by 1959.
